

Educational institutions have a duty of care to all their students, particularly those who experience marginalisation in their daily lives. We would encourage institutions to carefully consider the impacts of hosting events that may be perceived as promoting transphobia or discriminatory attitudes and to be mindful of recent research highlighting that trans and non-binary people in Aotearoa New Zealand experience high levels of psychological distress arising from their experiences of discrimination.

The Counting Ourselves survey released its findings last month showing that trans and non-binary people in Aotearoa New Zealand experience "alarmingly high levels of psychological distress, suicidal thoughts and suicide attempts". They also face high levels of discrimination and violence, as well as significant barriers when trying to access health services. https://countingourselves.nz/
