EXPENDITURE ADMINISTERED BY THE MINISTRY

In 2000/01 the Ministry incurred expenses of \$5.949 million (GST inclusive) in the provision of services under the departmental output classes Heritage Services and Policy Advice and Grants Administration.

The Ministry also administered the following non-departmental appropriations:

- ten output classes totalling \$135.582 million for services supplied, mainly by cultural sector Crown entities, comprising: ballet, orchestral, museum, public broadcasting, film archive and Māori performing arts activities, and the promotion and support of New Zealand films and the arts.
- three other expenses appropriations totalling \$3.688 million being:
 - \$1.438 million to the Otago Museum comprising the Government's contribution to a capital development project funded under the Policy for Government Assistance Towards Capital Projects at Regional Museums.
 - \$2.012 million being New Zealand's annual contribution to the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.
 - \$238,000 on the development and maintenance of services cemeteries, war graves, historic graves and monuments.
- a capital contribution of \$9 million to Te Papa for ongoing capital works, for museum operations and for exhibition research and development.
- a \$62,000 contribution towards the ANZAC Commemorative Park at Gallipoli.
- a \$3.363 million contribution towards the construction of the New Zealand Memorial in Canberra.

The Ministry was responsible for making payments for the services supplied under non-departmental appropriations, for ensuring that these appropriations were not exceeded, and for managing and monitoring on behalf of Ministers the Crown's interests in these organisations.

STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY

In terms of Sections 35 and 37 of the Public Finance Act 1989, I am responsible, as Chief Executive of the Ministry for Culture and Heritage, for the preparation of the Ministry's financial statements and the judgements made in the process of producing those statements.

Under the Public Finance Act 1989 and by delegation from the Secretary to The Treasury, trust money can only be invested on deposit with New Zealand registered banks or in New Zealand Government Stock. Trust money is also managed so there is no significant concentration of credit risk. Interest rate risk is managed by investing across a wide range of maturity dates, but subject to liquidity requirements.

New Zealand Encyclopedia Trust

This trust was established to hold New Zealand Lottery Grant Board funds to be used for the feasibility study on the production of the Encyclopedia New Zealand. The feasibility study has been completed and the Government has allocated funding for the project to commence in 2002/03.

New Zealand Historical Atlas Trust

This trust was established to hold New Zealand Lottery Grant Board funds, donations and royalties from sales to be used for the production of the Historical Atlas of New Zealand and subsidiary volumes.

New Zealand History Research Trust

This trust was established to hold New Zealand Lottery Grant Board funds to make awards to individuals for historic research and interpretation projects.

Antiquities Act

Cost

Outputs in this class will be provided within the appropriated sum of \$2.418 million (inclusive of GST). This was amended to \$3.231 million (inclusive of GST) in the 2000/01 Supplementary Estimates.

Service Performance

Dictionary of New Zealand Biography

Volumes I–V of the *Dictionary of New Zealand Biography* were in print at 30 June 2001; Volume V (English and Māori) was published in November 2000.

All published essays were completed to factual and reference standards as endorsed by the *Dictionary's* Policy Committee.

Electronic publication of DNZB Volumes I–V was 56.9% complete by 30 June 2001, slightly ahead of the estimated 50%. This will be offset by anticipated

Indemnification

During the year two Deeds of Indemnity for exhibitions, which complied with Cabinet guidelines and met the required deadlines of all parties, were signed by the Minister of Finance. They were for:

- an exhibition of Treasures from Christ Church Oxford at the Robert McDougall Art Gallery Christchurch between October and February, which was lifted without claim or incident prior to balance date; and
- a proposed exhibition of the Dead Sea Scrolls at the Auckland War Memorial Museum. The Auckland War Memorial Museum Trust Board subsequently decided not to proceed with the exhibition.

Grants Administration

Disbursement of Payments on Behalf of the Crown


Payments on behalf of the Crown to arts, culture, heritage and broadcasting sector agencies made by the Ministry during 2000/01 matched exactly the respective annual appropriations, with the exception of the contribution to the Commonwealth War Graves, where the underexpenditure of \$9,000 reflected a minor savings from exchange rates. All payments were made in accordance with instructions and conditions governing payment.

Monitoring of and Assistance to Recipients of Non-departmental Output Class Funding

Monitoring of recipients of Crown funding through Vote Arts, Culture and Heritage during 2000/01 was carried out in accordance with a monitoring regime agreed with the Minister for Arts, Culture and Heritage and the Minister of Broadcasting.

Throughout the year Te Papa, the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra, the Royal New Zealand Ballet, the Broadcasting Commission (NZ On Air), and the New Zealand Historic Places Trust provided the Minister with quarterly reports in accordance with their contracts for the purchase of services (and in the case of Te Papa, NZ On Air, and the NZSO, against their statements of intent). written by Rory Sweetman, looks at a key issue in education in the twentieth century. Two works of war history appeared during the year, both written by Ian McGibbon. Kiwi Sappers: The Corps of Royal New Zealand Engineers' Century of Service appeared for the anniversary of that group. New Zealand Battlefields and Memorials of the Western Front is a short guidebook that provides information for those wanting to examine the sites where New Zealanders fought during the First World War, or who wish to visit the graves of their forbears. This book signals an exciting new way of providing people with information about New Zealand history, and especially about war history, in which there is a steadily growing interest.

Historical Advice and Administrative Services

There is a growing interest in New Zealand history, and the Ministry continues to answer a large number of inquiries in this area. The website, <www.nzhistory.net.nz>, plays an important role in promoting New Zealand history both nationally and internationally. The fruits of many historical projects now appear as short exhibitions on the site, as well as in print form.

The number of applications for the Ministry's three funding schemes – Awards in History, Awards in Oral History, and Grants to Publishers – increased from the previous year.

Management of Cultural Heritage

Each year the Ministry oversees a substantial programme of maintenance of national monuments and war and historic graves in New Zealand. This year, amongst other projects, two major renovation projects have been carried out at the National War Memorial. The first was to replace the structure around the stained glass windows, which protects them from the weather and from breakage. The other major project was the removal of the asbestos ceiling from the Hall of Memories and preparation for a new ceiling covering to be installed in the coming year.

On 16 June 2002 a memorial to more than twenty Māori warriors who were killed in the Battle of Katikara in 1863 was unveiled. Until then, the burial site had gone unmarked except for a concrete slab over the mass grave. The memorial was a collaboration between the Ministry and the local hapū, Nga Mahanga a Tairi. This is indeed a project of historical significance. It is the first memorial initiated by the Crown that commemorates Māori who lost their lives in the New Zealand wars.

Research was carried out and a database developed to trace the graves of all New Zealand casualties of the South African War, which ended 100 years ago. The Ministry has been working with the New Zealand High Commission and the government agencies in South Africa to ensure that the graves of New Zealanders in South Africa are properly maintained.

Government funding is provided to support Waitangi Day commemorations. 2002 was the first year of the Ministry being responsible for administering this funding. There were 44 grants made to communities to fund Waitangi Day commemorative events. In addition, both the programme of events at Waitangi and the Governor-General's function in Wellington were funded.

Financial Performance

The Ministry's expenditure remained within each of its three departmental output class appropriations in 2001/02. Provision for payment of a net surplus of \$95,000 has been established in the Ministry's Statement of Financial Position as at 30 June 2002. Of this, \$62,000 relates to the under expenditure of funding on America's Cup activities, for which approval has been given by the Minister of Finance to carry over these funds into 2002/03.

Development of Ministry Capability

An external review of the Ministry's support services was completed by midyear. It concluded that the internal support services provided were of a high quality and vital in assisting managers and their staff to deliver their outputs. The review's recommendations regarding resourcing and priorities were implemented during the second half of the year, and have resulted in further improvements in the quality and scope of internal support provided.

A review of the Policy Group structure and operation was also completed in late 2001. The nature and scope of the group's work had undergone significant change over the last two years. It was timely to reassess whether the policy development and team management processes were most appropriate to support the changed operation. The new structure proposed by the review was implemented during the period, and all of the positions in the group had been filled as at 30 June.

As at 30 June a review of the Agency Advisory Group was about to commence, with a focus on structure, positions and recruitment. The significant additional work transferred from other agencies to this group during the year necessitated a fresh look at how it should be resourced and managed.

Work continued during the year on the development of the Ministry's capacity to appropriately reflect a Māori perspective in its work. Internal activity undertaken included te reo Māori lessons and a marae visit to enhance understanding of Māori protocols and custom. Seminars specifically targeting Māori places and place names, regular waiata practice and the inclusion of support through online computer technology as educational aids have also been provided. During the year the Ministry organised guest speakers to update staff on Māori views and perspectives. The Ministry has also engaged externally with Iwi organisations and other entities, to discuss Māori issues as part of its Ministry responsibilities.

Equal Employment Opportunities

Throughout the year the Ministry has maintained sound baseline EEO practices, and EEO is incorporated in mainstream management systems. The Ministry has continued to operate with family friendly policies, including a policy on family responsibilities and a framework for flexible work practices, and staff have utilised these policies as needed. The various human resources initiatives undertaken during the year were considered carefully in terms of their EEO implications during their development and implementation.

- administration of the Antiquities Act 1975; the research, writing and publication of New Zealand history; the administration of grants and the provision of advice in New Zealand history; and
- the provision of other negotiated services to Ministers, including the preparation of replies to Ministerial correspondence, and general services which assist Ministers in discharging portfolio obligations to Parliament.

ACCOUNTABILITIES

The Chief Executive of the Ministry was accountable to the Minister for Arts, Culture and Heritage for the production of the output classes detailed in the Statement of Service Performance, and for the efficient use of the resources invested by the Crown in the Ministry. Negotiated services were also provided to the Minister of Broadcasting, the Associate Minister for Arts, Culture and Heritage and the Minister for Sport, Fitness and Leisure.

Vote Arts, Culture and Heritage

In 2001/02 the Ministry incurred expenses of \$6.451 million (GST inclusive) in the provision of services under the departmental output classes Heritage Services, and Policy Advice and Grants Administration.

The Ministry also administered the following non-departmental appropriations:

- ten output classes totalling \$139.733 million for services supplied, mainly by cultural sector Crown entities, comprising: ballet, orchestral, museum, public broadcasting, film archive and Māori performing arts activities, and the promotion and support of New Zealand films and the arts.
- seven other expenses appropriations totalling \$5.598 million being:
 - \$2.2 million to the Puke Ariki Museum project, \$320,000 to the John Money Wing project at the Eastern Southland Gallery, and \$30,000 to the Wairarapa Arts & History Centre project comprising the Government's contribution to projects funded under the Regional Museums Policy for Capital Construction Projects.
 - \$2.086 million being New Zealand's annual contribution to the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.
 - \$299,000 for the development and maintenance of services cemeteries, war graves, historic graves and monuments.
 - \$200,000 towards the preservation of historic sites and artefacts in the Antarctic.
 - \$100,000 towards planning the celebrations of the 50th anniversary of Sir Edmund Hillary's ascent of Mt Everest.
 - \$323,000 towards the cost of Treaty commemorations held at Waitangi and within communities elsewhere in New Zealand.
 - \$40,000 to establish the Pukaki Trust, which will act as the guardian on behalf of the Crown for the taonga Pukaki;
- a capital contribution of \$9 million to Te Papa for ongoing capital works, for museum operations and for exhibition research and development; and
- a capital contribution of \$350,000 to purchase studios and transmission equipment for the National Pacific Radio service.

The Ministry was responsible for making payments for the services supplied under non-departmental appropriations, for ensuring that these appropriations were not exceeded, and for managing and monitoring on behalf of Ministers the Crown's interests in these organisations.

Output Class D2: Policy Advice and Grants Administration

This appropriation was increased by \$0.177 million - GST inclusive - from the Budget night appropriation of \$3.166 million through:

- an increase of \$100,000 for funding for America's Cup cultural activities;
- an increase of \$40,000 for the establishment of a Youth Radio Advisory Board:
- an increase of \$88,000 to support monitoring and advice in regard to the Broadcasting Standards Authority;
- an increase of \$30,000 to support monitoring and advice in regard to the establishment of the National Pacific Radio Trust; and
- a decrease of \$81,000 resulting from a change in the apportionment of corporate overheads as a result of staff movements.

Vote Sport, Fitness and Leisure

Output Class D2: Purchase Advice and Monitoring of Sport and Recreation Crown Entities

From January 2002, the administrative functions relating to providing purchase advice and monitoring of sport and recreation Crown entities were transferred from the Ministry of Economic Development to the Ministry for Culture and Heritage. An appropriation of \$55,000 (GST inclusive) was allocated in Supplementary Estimates for this.

Public Broadcasting Funding: Expenditure on output class Public Broadcasting Funding exceeded budget by \$484,000, made up as follows:

- additional expenditure of \$495,000 was incurred by the National Pacific Radio Trust in establishing a pilot Pacific radio network (explained in more detail in the Statement of Unappropriated Expenditure on page 42); and
- the expenditure incurred in producing the report Towards Precautionary Risk Management of TV Violence in New Zealand was \$11,000 less than budgeted.

Tomb of the Unknown Warrior: In June 2004 approval was obtained to carry forward to 2004/05 any unspent 2003/04 capital funding for the construction of the Tomb of the Unknown Warrior at the National War Memorial in Wellington. The \$35,000 to be carried forward will be added to the \$1.771 million 2004/05 funding provided to complete the project in 2004. The total amount spent on this project to 30 June 2004 is included in the Schedule of Non-Departmental Assets.





 - \$6,000 to conduct a review of the nature of Government's involvement in the Waitangi National Trust.
- \$788,000 to enable Creative New Zealand to develop online services and upgrade its historic building premises.
- \$12.5 million capital contribution to Te Papa for ongoing capital expenditure for museum operations, exhibition research and development, and acquisition of collection items.
- \$4.953 million to purchase land for the establishment of a National Memorial Park in Wellington.
- \$350,000 to New Zealand Historic Places Trust for an upgrade of information technology systems and regional office vehicles, and urgent deferred maintenance of historic properties.
- \$2.643 million to Radio New Zealand in support of a range of radio broadcasting initiatives.

In Budget 2005 the government approved funding of \$60,000 in 2005/06 for the construction of a New Zealand Memorial in Korea. Additional expenditure of \$45,000 was incurred on the installation through the unforeseen necessity to engage a sub-contractor and architect to manage the installation on site. The shortfall was addressed through a fiscally neutral transfer from the non-departmental other expense appropriation 'Development and Maintenance of War Graves, Historic Graves and Monuments' in the 2006 March Baseline Update.

In Budget 2004 the government approved funding of \$6 million in 2004/05 and \$2.5 million in 2006/07 for the acquisition of land on Buckle Street in Wellington opposite the National War Memorial, for the establishment of a National Memorial Park. At the end of 2004/05 negotiations were continuing for the acquisition of the Buckle Street properties from Transit New Zealand. Agreement had not been reached over the extent of the land available or the purchase price. Any agreement was conditional on approval by Cabinet which extended the time it took to

conclude the purchase. An in-principle transfer of \$6 million was agreed as part of the 2004/05 March Baseline Update. The land was transferred to the Ministry from Transit New Zealand on 27 October 2005, and \$5.986 million was confirmed as an expense transfer from 2004/05 to 2005/06 in the 2005/06 October Baseline Update to meet the cost of the transaction.

The Ministry reported \$104,000 non-departmental unappropriated expenditure for 2004/05 in respect of the New Zealand Memorial in London project, which was due to a timing issue.
