Flights resumed on 3 May. Travellers who visited locations of interest in Western Australia since 27 April cannot travel to New Zealand until 14 days after an exposure event. Officials are continuing to seek a solution for New Zealand travellers from parts of the Pacific who are now unable to transit through Australia due to a lack of "red" flights. 2.1.1 Flight Arrivals and Departures

In the week of Wednesday 28 April to 4 May 2021 there were a total of 22,057 arrivals to New Zealand, and 19,853 departures. This is 2,204 more people that arrived into New Zealand than departed. This is illustrated in figure 1. ²

For Australia, there were 20,660 arrivals into New Zealand and 18,042 departures to Australia. This is 2,618 more arrivals into New Zealand than departures from New Zealand to Australia.

For the week, there were 199 flights from Australia into New Zealand, as shown in figure 2. Most flights were into Auckland (113 flights, 14,434 passengers) with flights from all main airports in Australia. Christchurch, Wellington and Queenstown only had flights from some airports in Australia.

2.1.2 COVID-19 Vaccinations in New Zealand and Australia

COVID-19 Vaccinations in New Zealand

- In New Zealand there have been 304,000 vaccination doses administered: ³
 - 217,000 first doses
 - 87,000 second doses.
- This is approximately 1.7% of the population that have been fully vaccinated.⁴

First and Second Doses of Vaccine




Figure 3: First and Second Vaccinations by DHB

Vaccination levels differ by region. Figure 3 below shows first and second doses of the COVID-19 vaccine by DHB of residence.




Figure 4: DHB Vaccination Targets

To date, total vaccinations administered are 3% above the planned targets. Most vaccination targets have been met, as shown in figure 4.

3. Ministry of Health Weekly Report

3.1 Policy/Programme Updates





As at 4 May 2021, 304,900 vaccinations have been delivered, including 87,297 people who are fully vaccinated. Of those fully vaccinated 8.8 percent are Māori, 7 percent are Pasifika, and 19.2 percent are Asian. 190 sites were active on 4 May 2021.

The allocation plan for the next seven days is for 60,840 doses across Zealand.

Mass vaccination events

Work is underway to scope and plan for large vaccination events.

A joint programme team has been established across the Ministry of Health, metro Auckland district health boards (DHBs), and our event planner. We are indicatively aiming for a first large event in June 2021 to test and learn from the concept in the New Zealand context. The volumes that could be achieved through this model are being worked through in discussion with DHBs. The anticipated start date for the large volumes will be from late August 2021.

A key dependency of mass vaccination events is the National Booking System, as set out below.

Technology (National Booking System)

The National Booking System will be used by administrators at two DHBs and a call centre as a production pilot this week. It is expected that five sites will use the National Booking System by mid-May 2021. Rollout will progress rapidly following a successful pilot.

The Programme is confident that the National Booking System will be ready in time for mass vaccination events to commence.

DHB plans to end of June 2021

DHB week by week plans are now available to the public on the COVID-19 website. The Ministry of Health is monitoring DHBs against plans and working with DHBs that are not tracking to these plans. A planning session between the Ministry, Northland and Northern Region Health Coordination Centre (NRHCC) is taking place on 5 May 2021 to assist with forward order planning and assess other support that might be required.

Border worker vaccinations to date

Work continues to ascertain accurate data regarding the number of vaccinated and unvaccinated border and managed isolation and quarantine workers. The Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment is reporting the vaccination of border workers separately.

The COVID-19 Public Health Response (Vaccinations) Order 2021, which came into force on 30 April 2021, will enable the Ministry of Health to release all information on the vaccination status of employees to border employers. We will provide information either through the Border Worker Testing Register or other mechanisms, where this is available.

Incident reporting

A routine vaccination monitoring report to Medsafe highlighted the people under 16 that are receiving vaccinations. On verification of each COVID-19 Immunisation Register (CIR) event, a total of eight children were confirmed to have been administered a COVID-19 dose.

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The age range of the eight children was 13 to 15 years. The children reside in five DHBs. One of the eight children was fully vaccinated.

A letter was sent to the affected DHBs on 30 April 2021. The letter included clinical advice that there are no additional safety concerns for the children. It also provided clear guidance not to proceed to the second dose until the children age into the programme i.e. turn 16 years of age. Each DHB has an investigation underway to identify the local contributing factors.

Response-led system changes are already in place, including a new flag alert in the CIR to highlight that a person is under 16 years of age and a review of programme collateral to strengthen messages on age eligibility. Media lines are prepared in case of public interest.

Workforce

As of 4 May 2021, 3,989 vaccinators have completed COVID-19 vaccinator training and 1,582 vaccinators have actively vaccinated in the programme so far.

The current focus is on building the workforce pipeline for DHB recruitment through:

- an enhanced surge workforce registration process
- a data cleanse of the existing surge database
- implementing consistent workforce planning protocols at DHB level to improve national forecasting of vaccinator need
- addressing regulatory and training hurdles to activate a non-regulated vaccinator workforce.

The Programme Steering Group approved to proceed on a regulatory change to allow the non-regulated workforce to administer vaccines under supervision. The first pilot training programme for this workforce is expected to be held on 13 to 14 May 2021.

Distribution and inventory management

As at 4 May 2021, we have made 573 deliveries to sites across the country with zero failures. This equates to delivery of 52,615 vials or 315,690 doses.

The Ministry of Health has received approval to proceed with the direct sourcing of a second national distribution hub in Christchurch to supply South Island sites and to mitigate the risk of a single supply from Health Care Logistics in Auckland. The Christchurch hub is due to come online in July 2021.

Communications

Phase two of the national information campaign has started with household mailer drops, digital billboards and press and radio advertisements.

Other key activities include planning for launch events focussed on Pacific communities in Counties Manukau in early May 2021, and the development of misinformation toolkits and key messages.

Rollout of the vaccine to Polynesia

Cook Islands

The Ministry of Health continues to meet weekly with the Cook Islands Ministry of Health to discuss progress against the jointly developed plan to support its vaccine rollout from mid-May 2021. The target date for wet run (vaccination of vaccinators) is 19 May 2021, with subsequent rollout on 20 May 2021. Confirmation of the rollout date will be made once Vaccine

Ministers have confirmed dose donation to the Cook Islands, arrangements have been formalised with the pharmaceutical company, and the Cook Islands have confirmed the flight schedule.

Donation of AstraZeneca to Fiji

New Zealand has offered 500,000 doses of AstraZeneca from New Zealand's domestic vaccine portfolio, which also includes \$2 million of Official Development Assistance for Fiji's National Deployment Vaccination Plan to support vaccine rollout.

AstraZeneca confirmed they are comfortable with this donation being shared publicly. An official announcement of the donation is expected to happen over the next few days.

3.2 Technical Advisory Group: Update

Technical Advisory Group meeting on 30 April 2021

The Technical Advisory Group (TAG) met on 30 April 2021. TAG was updated on draft documents and thinking relating to the Elimination Strategy and Reconnecting New Zealand. TAG provided feedback on the draft documents and issues to consider in terms of phases of border re-opening.

COVID-19 Vaccine Technical Advisory Group meeting on 27 April 2021

The COVID-19 Vaccine Technical Advisory Group (CVTAG) met on 27 April 2021. The key points that were discussed were:

- Vaccines in immunocompromised individuals: The Ministry of Health aims to communicate
 that the vaccine is safe and effective, and the decision should be made by the individual in
 conjunction with their healthcare provider. CVTAG will receive an update on the Cancer
 Control Agency's vaccination guidance.
- Vaccine rollout: A request was received for administrative and IT purposes to define a maximum allowable time interval between doses. The suggestion based on current evidence and recommendations from the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation and United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is for six weeks, however, this is solely for administrative purposes and is not a clinical recommendation. In general, the second dose should be given as close to the recommended three-week gap as possible. The Ministry of Health will follow up with the CIR team to make sure this advice is clear.
- Adverse event reporting: Issues with the adverse event reporting system (CIR) were being
 addressed by the Ministry of Health. More information will be provided to CVTAG on this
 matter.
- CVTAG received an update on the baseline survey of adverse events study. The study has been
 re-prioritised and will no longer look at anaphylaxis but will focus on priorities that were
 initially set, including thrombotic issues. Funding from the Global Vaccine Data Network will
 allow for collaboration and evaluation of baseline rates.
- Seroprevalence study: Researchers at the University of Auckland found that New Zealand has
 low seroprevalence of ~0.1%, suggesting a very low amount of undetected community
 transmission. It was highlighted that the more vulnerable Māori and Pacific populations were
 underrepresented in this study. CVTAG noted that at this stage there is no current need for

further seroprevalence studies in New Zealand, given the low rate of infection, however, this may change as border restrictions are amended and as New Zealand's situation changes.

4. Managed Isolation and Quarantine Weekly Report



4.1 Top Items to Note

4.1.1 Staff testing update - compliance statistics for 19-25 April 2021

- Last week's staff testing compliance information shows that 4,495 people undertook work in our facilities last week and of these:
 - 3,825 were compliant with their obligations;
 - 273 were overdue; and
 - 397 were still to have their NHI-matched (157 of these only had their BWTR profile created this week).
- Of those that were NHI-matched, 93.3% were compliant and 6.7% were overdue. This is the highest compliance rate since we started regularly reporting on staff testing compliance.
- Of the 273 who were overdue, 226 had a previous swab and 47 were recorded as not having had a swab, although 12 of these people have already provided evidence to the workforce testing team that they are regularly being swabbed.
- We are continuing to proactively work with each of the employers who have staff listed as not having had a test to ensure compliance is achieved and staff are being tested in accordance with their obligation. Work is ongoing with the Ministry of Health to ensure that any data / technical issues are resolved as quickly as possible.

4.1.2 Vaccination of frontline staff update

- 100% of the MIQ workforce currently working in MIQFs have received at least their first dose of the Pfizer vaccine.
- Employers are still working through employment processes with 51 unvaccinated workers, and these workers are not able to work in the MIQF while this process is occurring.
- From 5 June, all MIQ workers must have received their second dose of the Pfizer vaccine and will be required to provide evidence of the second dose to be allowed access to a MIQF.
- MBIE has established a process where evidence of worker vaccination status is verified by onsite security before site access can be granted.
- MBIE are aware that not all the border workforce and employers have readily available access
 to evidence of their vaccination status. As such, MoH have generated a report of vaccination
 status from BWTR that can be used to issue an MIQ Vaccination Certificate, which can be
 produced by the worker as evidence of vaccination to meet the conditions of entry.

4.2 Operational update

4.2.1 Capacity update

- From early March to present, over 62,200 returnees from over 180 countries have secured a voucher to return home during the period of March through to the end of July 2021.
- On the 5th of May, 5,673 rooms were released for August and September 2021.
- As at 6am 6th May 2021, there were over 2,607 rooms available for the period of May through to September 2021, spread across all months.
- All vouchers held by Australians have been cancelled.

4.2.2 Wellington NZDF Terminal IPC Audit

- Noting the Cabinet decision allowing Green/Red flights to operate from the NZDF Terminal at Rongotai, the MoH Quality Assurance and Safety team conducted an audit. Notably the audit was conducted during the arrival of the latest group to arrive in Wellington for MIQ. The following points are noted:
- Overall no major concerns were raised with the process. Minor areas for improvement included: positioning of staff, surface cleaning in buses, adjust IPC station procedures and a recommendation for the contracted bus drivers and a police officer to have a refit for the N95 mask.
- The audit indicated that the recent redesign of the flow process within the NZDF terminal
 facility has seen significant improvements. Not only was reduced time at the facility observed,
 but the upstairs lounge will only need to be used in a contingency situation, thus increasing
 the number of people who could arrive on a red domestic transfer flight (agreed lounge limit
 with the NZDF is 60).
- No assessment has been made, or planning conducted, for the facilitation of international arrival red flights. WIAL has been clear with MIQ that it has no plans (or desire) to open terminal services at Wellington Airport to international red flights.

4.2.3 Update on investigations – Grand Mercure and Grand Millennium

Grand Mercure

- The findings of the Grand Mercure ventilation review have been reviewed by the hotel. The hotel has provided a formal response detailing their maintenance proposal and have indicated this work is expected to take around two weeks, commencing 3 May 2021.
- The detailed report on the Grand Mercure findings along with the hotel's maintenance proposal response were shared with the MIQ Technical Advisory Group (TAG) on 4 May 2021. Further discussions are to be held with the hotel to clarify the proposed work.
- The joint Ministry of Health / MIQ incident review has been completed and will be provided to your Office on Friday 7 May 2021.
- We will be writing to the 14 returnees who were at the Grand Mercure and had their stay
 extended by an additional 14 days as a result of the bubble breach on the bus to a Managed
 Isolation Walk, to provide them with a copy of the MIQ investigation and what we have
 done in response.
- We are also proposing to waive the MIQ fees for those returnees who are eligible and were required to stay an additional 14 days.

Grand Millennium

- We are still waiting on the results from the Independent Qualified Persons (IQP) assessment, these are now expected around 7 May 2021.
- Once the IQP assessment is received, internal MBIE analysis will be undertaken and an HVAC Engineer will also review the findings.
- These findings with an initial view of the hotel's response will be presented to the TAG for consideration.

4.2.4 MIQ Facilities Ventilation Review

- The MBIE-led onsite testing of ventilation systems continues.
- 23 of 31 sites have provided full or provisional onsite test results to MBIE.

- MBIE have prepared written test results for 17 of the 23 sites. The HVAC Engineer has
 reviewed all 17 reports and has completed summary reports for 8 of the sites, with the
 remaining 9 partially complete pending additional testing detail / clarification from the IQP.
- Of the remaining 8 sites, the on-site ventilation testing is underway for 7 and is scheduled for the remaining 1.

4.2.5 Filtration Unit Deployment

- Following the establishment of the panel of suppliers of air filtration units, the Ministry of Health has confirmed the requirements for 7 Auckland facilities. The units are in the process of being delivered and installed.
- The requirements for the 6 Christchurch facilities have been confirmed, with delivery of units and installation expected to be complete by 9 May 2021.
- The roll out of units for shared spaces within facilities is expected to be complete by 30 May 2021.
- In addition, the Ministry of Health are progressing the installation of units in the swabbing rooms of facilities, where the size of and ventilation within the room poses a specific risk. Units were installed in the Sebel Manukau in mid-April 2021, and will be installed in the three Rotorua facilities in the week beginning 3 May 2021.

4.2.6 Ombudsman update

- We have responded to the Office of the Ombudsman on the Jet Park Final Report we have accepted the recommendations and noted that all recommendations had already been addressed and that we will put a process in place to ensure we maintain these.
- We have received the final report for the Four Points and are required to respond to the Office on whether or not we accept all recommendations.

4.2.7 Employers Network

Building on our existing relationships, we are looking to establish the MIQ Employers
Network. The purpose of this group is to take an integrated and forward-thinking approach
to planning for, supporting and managing the MIQ workforce. We are looking to host the
first meeting during May 2021.

4.2.8 Appointment of the MIQ Director Māori

- On 27 April 2021, Sam Bishara was welcomed into MIQ as the permanent Director Māori, replacing our interim Director Māori, with a focus on strengthening engagement and enhanced relationships with iwi across the MIQ regions.
- MIQ's interim Director developed Te Arawhiti engagement guidelines and a capability framework which helped improve relationships and engagement with iwi. The appointment of a permanent director, who will be supported by regional roles, will help MIQ further meet our obligations and strengthen partnerships.
- Sam Bishara is currently working on supporting MIQ intention to undertake a wānanga with our regional iwi partners here in MIQ head office that will be held the week commencing 14 June 2021.



6.1 Items to Note

Discussions are continuing in the World Trade Organisation on a proposed waiver of IP rules in support of access to COVID-19 vaccines. The WTO Director General has sought to broaden discussions to include the WHO, NGOs, pharmaceutical companies and generic manufacturers as well as to address wider trade related of issues in vaccine supply chains that are limiting availability including tariff barriers, regulatory restrictions, export restrictions and trade facilitation measures. The announcement by the US that it supports the waiving intellectual property protections for COVID-19 vaccines will dramatically shift the nature of the discussions in the WTO adity. Ad given the US' previous opposition to the waiver. New Zealand has announced it welcomes the US

7. Border Executive Board Report



7.1 Key Issues Being Considered by the Executive Board

7.1.1 Border Executive Board meeting

The Border Executive Board met on 6 May and will next meet on 13 May.

7.1.2 Border Workforce

- Agencies and affected border organisations are now required to ensure that all affected border staff are vaccinated before carrying out work at a certain places (in summary, this means MIQ workers, government agency border staff and certain domestic cabin crew).
- Ministry of Transport led advice on COVID-19 vaccination requirements at the border (tranche 2 – this is mostly the private transport sector working at the border).
- Use of the Border Workforce Testing Resister is now compulsory.

7.1.3 Risk mitigation for travellers from very high risk countries

- Officials continue to work together to implement the new requirements for restrictions for travellers from very high risk countries.
- Whilst agencies have reported no implementation issues to date, this was likely influenced by very few travellers arriving from very high risk countries.

7.1.4 Quarantine Free Travel

- To support continuous improvement, the Border Executive Board has requested that a rapid review of Quarantine Free Travel be undertaken across relevant agencies. The review is anticipated to consider key events / issues that have occurred since the commencement of the trans-Tasman QFT on 19 Apr 21, along with any reviews already undertaken into these events / issues, to identify areas that have gone well and where aspects could be improved.
- Work is underway by agencies into the possible integration of Quarantine Free Travel into the maritime space, covering both commercial and private vessels. The Ministry of Health is hosting and facilitating an inter-agency workshop on 6 May 21 in relation to this.
- Agencies continue with preparations to implement two-way quarantine free travel with the Cook Islands which is scheduled to commence on 17 May 21.

8.1 Maritime Border Order

- The introduction of the COVID-19 Public Health Reponses (Vaccinations) Order 2021 not only
 affects current Customs' staff but also new appointments to positions covered by the Order.
- Customs is updating its new appointment documentation to reflect the Order requirements.
 New appointments to positions covered must have received their first vaccination before commencement and then received their second vaccination within 35 days of starting.
- Customs has a new cohort of Assistant Customs Officers (Maritime) due to commence next week. Advice has been provided to these new appointments in order that they can arrange to have their first vaccination before their start date.
- Should a first vaccination not be feasible by their start date then either the start date will be
 pushed back or the employee will need to be deployed to non-operational work for a shortterm period.

COVID-19 Modelling Steering Group

9.1 Items to Note/Updates

9.1.1 Te Pūnaha Matatini Modelling

The COVID-19 Modelling Steering Group is working with Shaun Hendy, and other Te Pūnaha Matatini (TPM) researchers, on modelling which explores COVID-19 dynamics across different vaccination coverage states for the New Zealand population. Interpretation of the results has been discussed with the researchers, and officials have separately been considering policy implications.

Officials are discussing the public release schedule and the communications plans with TPM.

Ahead of that:

- Officials and TPM are seeking to share modelling results and discuss insights with the Strategic COVID-19 Public Health Advisory Group in the near future.
- Officials will provide briefings to the Minister of COVID-19 Response, and to the Associate Minister of Health (Public Health). This will include key insights from the modelling, application to current and future policy settings, release schedule for the current results and an indication of near-term modelling priorities.

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2. COVID-19 Insights

2.1 Insights of Note

2.1.1 Plateaus in International Vaccination Progress




Figure 1: Vaccination Progress by Nation Showing both Plateaus and Growth

The vaccination rollout in some countries appears to have plateaued at just over 60% and may give an indication of possible saturation points that might inform the New Zealand response. See figure 1 below.

The countries with the highest vaccination progress by share of population are the Seychelles (69%), Israel (63%), and San Marino (62%).¹

The Seychelles and Israel have plateaued for the last two months, and it appears that San Marino is also starting to plateau, while other nations that are still rolling-out their programme continue to progress upwards.

Both the Seychelles and Israel started their vaccination programs early. The Seychelles began to plateau in less than two months, and Israel began to plateau within three months. San Marino appears to be starting to plateau, despite starting later, in late February.

The Seychelles, Israel and San Marino are relatively small in population, which likely enabled them to achieve greater vaccination coverage at a faster rate and begin to show possible saturation. The Seychelles has a population of approximately 69,000,³ San Marino has a population of 34,000,⁴ and Israel has 8.7 million people.⁵

Factors which could contribute to plateaus in a vaccine roll-out include vaccine hesitancy, supply chain and manufacturing issues, and the proportion of the population that are ineligible for vaccination (such as youth under 16).6

For the Seychelles, it is possible that vaccine hesitancy due to side effects and effectiveness concerns regarding the Sinopharm vaccine^{7 8} are factors that are driving the plateau as the Seychelles are currently experiencing an outbreak, 9 despite 69% of the population being vaccinated. For Israel, the likely driving factors of the plateau include vaccine hesitancy, as well as vaccine accessibility for those in rural communities. 10 For San Marino, it is possible that vaccine hesitancy is a factor. 11

Vaccination progress in the United Arab Emirates, 12 Bahrain, and the United States, continues to increase, with 51%, 47% and 45% of the population vaccinated respectively, ¹³ so it is unknown when they may begin to plateau.

In New Zealand a recent survey indicates that approximately 69% of the population are willing to receive a COVID-19 vaccination.14

3. Ministry of Health Weekly Report

3.1 Items to Note/Updates



3.1.1 Publication of Fortnightly COVID-19 Disease Indicator Summary Report

The Ministry of Health is planning to release the most recent fortnightly COVID-19 disease indicator summary report (the report) on the Ministry's website covering the period from 9 April 2021 to 22 April 2021.

This report was developed based on the recommendations in the report titled 'Rapid Audit of Contact Tracing for COVID-19 in New Zealand' and provides an end-to-end view of the public health response to COVID-19 for cases and close contacts.

The key points of interest for this report are:

- This reporting period involves two community cases, and their associated close contacts. One
 is linked to the March 2021 Auckland managed isolation and quarantine facility (MIQF) cluster
 (Case C) and the other is the April 2021 Auckland Airport case.
- While the public health and system indicators P002, P004, and S003 are below target due to
 the delayed identification of contacts following the initial case investigation, P001 and P003
 show that once a case or contact has been identified the case investigation and contact
 tracing system performance is above target, at 100 percent and 98 percent, respectively, for
 this reporting period.
- There were 37 cases in MIQF during this period.

Next steps

The reports will be released on the Ministry of Health's website during the week of 10 May 2021.

3.2 Policy/Programme Updates

3.2.1 COVID-19 Vaccine and Immunisation Programme

As at 11 May 2021, 388,877 vaccinations have been delivered, including 120,090 people who are fully vaccinated. Of those fully vaccinated 9 percent are Māori, 7 percent are Pasifika, and 19 percent are Asian. 100 sites were active on 11 May 2021.

The allocation plan for the next seven days is for 71,324 doses across New Zealand.

Providing a COVID-19 Immunisation Programme update to Cabinet

We are preparing a draft Cabinet paper that is due to be submitted to Cabinet in the week beginning 17 May 2021, which will provide an update on the COVID-19 Vaccine and Immunisation Programme's (CVIP) readiness for general population rollout in July 2021. A second Cabinet paper will be prepared for June 2021 providing more detailed plans on CVIP readiness to scale up.

General practice and pharmacy rollout

Planning documents supporting the utilisation of existing vaccinating primary care providers in CVIP have been developed with stakeholders from general practice and community pharmacy.

District Health Boards (DHBs) are already collaborating with both community pharmacy and general practice to deliver community hubs in several areas in the country. To support greater rollout to primary care settings in July 2021, the following is being developed:

- a payment mechanism linked to entry of vaccination into the COVID-19 Immunisation Register (CIR) – due at the end of June 2021
- a distribution network that enables delivery of vaccine to large numbers of sites (i.e. all participating primary care settings) direct from Health Care Logistics, the Auckland storage facility
- a level of integration between practice management systems and CIR that minimises doubleentry and allows efficient vaccine delivery alongside other practice activities - due at the end of July 2021
- adoption of the national booking system in those primary care settings where vaccination is being offered beyond an enrolled population.

Approval process for Pfizer usage for under 16s

Pfizer has informed Medsafe that it will seek to vary the approval (and provide data) for Comirnaty to 12 years and over in late May 2021. Medsafe will prioritise the assessment and decision, which is expected to be in June 2021 depending on the data provided.

CVIP is already planning for the impact of this change, with existing agreements with Pfizer providing sufficient vaccines to cover this additional age bracket. Preliminary discussion will start this week with DHBs regarding planning for vaccinations of school aged children. These discussions will initially focus on children aged 16 to 18 but will also factor in the possible expansion of vaccine eligibility to children aged 12 to 15. Timing for the rollout of vaccines to students will also factor in the National Certificate of Educational Achievement exam timetable and likely study leave for students to have the lowest possible impact on the education system.

Equity

Commissioning of Māori providers

The Ministry of Health is working with DHBs and Māori health providers to deliver the \$11 million for Māori provider preparedness, in anticipation of the COVID-19 vaccine rollout. The majority of this funding, \$7,779,369, has been finalised into contract with 39 providers across the four major DHB regions.

Discussions are in final stages with 29 Māori health providers. Of these, ten contracts have been agreed and are proceeding through formal paperwork. The Ministry of Health is actively facilitating budget negotiation discussions with the remaining 19 Māori providers and their respective DHBs. It is expected these final contracts will be finalised in the coming weeks.

Pacific people's engagement

As at 4 May 2021, 14 DHBs have submitted DHB plans for vaccine rollout to Pacific peoples within Tier 2(b). The Ministry of Health is monitoring these plans and managing any areas of concern.

Disability

The Ministry of Health COVID Programme, in conjunction with Tātou Whaikaha, have developed the Disability Strategy and Plan. Core components include, appropriate disability specific accommodations in all sites, alternate formats translations of all public facing communications and engagement, developed supported decision making process in alignment to the Health and Disability Code of Rights (Right 7) and development of appropriate and feasible alternate delivery options as required by some disabled people.

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Technology

The distribution and inventory portal launched on 3 May 2021. The tool allows DHBs to maintain visibility of stock within their network and allows for systematic communication of forecast and stock information between sites, DHBs and the Ministry of Health.

There will be a significant CIR release on 13 May 2021. Changes include:

- a warning flag when a user attempts to record a second dose within 21 days of the first dose
- ability to record an overseas vaccination for the first immunisation event
- initial minimum viable product solution to enable Whakarongorau to record details of communications
- payments functionality that will enable provider organisations to be paid based on immunisation activities recorded in CIR.

The National Booking System with the base elements of site capacity and scheduling, and appointment selection and confirmation has been built. The Ministry of Health is working with all DHBs to provide training and onboard sites throughout late May and June 2021. In the initial stages it is anticipated that DHBs and sites will provide population groups codes to book online or direct to the call centre.

Within the booking system, the public will be able to search to find the closest centres to them based on post code or address, within a predefined radius.

Workforce

As of 11 May 2021, 4,783 vaccinators have completed COVID-19 vaccinator training and 1,820 vaccinators have actively vaccinated in the programme so far.

The Health Report provided to your office this week for approval is required to proceed with the regulatory change to enable the non-regulated, now referred to as the Vaccinator Assistants (working title) workforce. The Health Report provided an overview of next steps and anticipated timelines.

We are on track for the pilot of the training of Vaccinator Assistants on 13 and 14 May 2021. An evaluation of this pilot will be completed before the national rollout in June 2021.

Distribution and inventory management

As at 11 May 2021, we have made 658 deliveries to sites across the country with zero failures. This equates to delivery of 67,170 vials or 403,020 doses.

The Ministry of Health has approved extension of the contract with New Zealand Post/ Pace Couriers. The CVIP Logistics team has worked closely with New Zealand Post to ring-fence capacity for the programme, mapping new linehaul and point-to-point delivery options for the vaccine from 1 June 2021.

Communications

Our priority this week has been working with DHBs to ensure their key communication channels – social and web – are up to date to reflect local messaging and information about when and how Group 3 members will be vaccinated. From a proactive media perspective, all DHBs are working to identify opportunities to highlight commencement of Group 3 at a local level as the ramp-up progresses. The focus will primarily be on over 65s now being eligible to be vaccinated. This week

has also seen the start of messaging to build public awareness on vaccine supply limitations until the end of June 2021.

Rollout of the vaccine to Polynesia

The Ministry of Health continues to meet weekly with the Cook Islands Ministry of Health to discuss progress against the jointly developed plan to support their vaccine rollout from mid-May 2021, subject to a final readiness assessment and sign-off, and decisions about usage of New Zealand Pfizer supply. The target date for wet run (vaccination of vaccinators) is 19 May 2021, with subsequent rollout on 20 May 2021.

The Ministry of Health had a successful two-day workshop with officials from the Niuean Ministry of Health to develop a joint plan for vaccine rollout. We will be holding weekly meetings with Niue to monitor progress. Our target dates for rollout are either 2 June or 9 June 2021, subject to progress made against the joint plan.

An announcement by the Government of New Zealand's support for the realm countries (The Cook Islands, Tokelau and Niue) is expected this week.

Next steps

We will provide you with a further update in the next Weekly Report.

4. Managed Isolation and Quarantine Weekly Report



4.1 Top Items to Note

4.1.1 Staff testing update - compliance statistics for 3-9 May 2021

- Reporting from BWTR shows that 4,397 people undertook work in our facilities last week and of these:
 - 3,958 were compliant with their obligations;
 - 350 were overdue; and
 - 89 were still to have their NHI-matched.
- Of those that were NHI-matched, 92% were compliant and 8% were overdue.
- Of the 8% of workers (350) that were non-compliant, the majority (327) have had a previous swab and 23 were recorded as not having had a swab. However, 7 of 23 workers have provided evidence of a regular swab. The BWTR team have been notified of these workers.
- Of the 350 non-compliant workers, 143 are overdue by 6 to 9 days, 98 are overdue by 10+ days.
- Healthcare workers make up 21 percent of the overdue workers, which is not unexpected as they are now on a 7-day swab cycle, rather than every 14 days. This change came into effect on 22 April 2021.
- A formal compliance monitoring and employer follow up process is being established within
 the Workforce Testing team so cases for follow-up can be assigned to Workforce Advisors
 and progress reporting regularly scheduled. However, while the process is formalised, the
 team has started doing this work. At the moment, the Team are following up with employers
 by phone and email to notify them of staff overdue for swabs.
- Employers contacted seem receptive to follow-ups from the Workforce Testing Team as they
 want to ensure their staff are compliant. Many PCBUs are now checking BWTR themselves
 regularly to check employee compliance.

4.1.2 Vaccination of frontline staff update

- Employers are still working through employment processes with 24 unvaccinated workers, and these workers are not able to work in the MIQF while this process is occurring.
- From 5 June, all MIQ workers must have received their second dose of the Pfizer vaccine and will be required to provide evidence of the second dose to be allowed access to a MIQF.
- As at 12 May 2021, 16% of the MIQ Workforce are yet to receive the second dose of the vaccination.
- MBIE has established a process where evidence of worker vaccination status is verified by onsite security before site access can be granted and regular communications continues to remind workers of acceptable evidence of vaccination status.
- So far MIQ has issued 8,400 worker vaccination certificates to employers to use as vaccination evidence where we have verified data that confirms the worker's vaccination status.

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4.1.3 MIQ Leadership Forum

- MIQ hosted the MIQ Leadership Forum on 12 and 13 May 2021.
- The purpose was to bring together COVID-19 MIQ leaders from across a range of agencies to share learnings, celebrate progress and focus on future strategic matters for MIQ. Speakers external to the MIQ system include:
 - Professor Michael Baker, University of Otago
 - Mike Driver, UK Department of Health and Social Care
 - Dr Lyn James, Singapore Ministry of Health

4.2 Operational update

4.2.1 Capacity update

- From early March to present, over 66,300 returnees from over 180 countries have secured a voucher to return home during the period of March through to the end of September 2021.
- As at 11am 10th May 2021, there were over 3,680 rooms available for the period of May through to September 2021, spread across all months, however late May and June have very limited availability now.

4.2.2 Health and Safety update

- We are constantly looking for ways to make it easier for all the workers from across the many employers that make up the MIQ workforce to report health and safety concerns.
- In many instances our workers are reporting concerns not only via the home employers reporting systems and channels but also through the MIQ facility incident reporting system, site management or via their site Health and Safety Representatives and on-site health and safety committees.
- We are looking at the potential to leverage off the existing MIQ complaints process to make it easier and simpler for our workers to raise any health and safety concerns.

4.2.3 Returnees impacted at Grand Mercure

- For the 14 returnees who had to stay an additional 14 days at the Grand Mercure following their exposure to the COVID-19 positive returnee on the bus to the managed isolation walk, we have determined that we will waive the fees for the nine who are eligible to pay.
- Once the Joint Incident Review into this situation has been finalised, we will write to them all to apologise for what occurred, outline what we found through our investigation and what we have done in response. This will also outline that we have waived the fees.

4.2.4 De-designation of the Grand Mercure and Grand Millennium

- The Grand Mercure and Grand Millenium were de-designated as Managed Isolation Facilities (MIFs) on 5 May 2021.
- This allows the facilities to undergo an extensive assessment of their ventilation systems and remedial work, allows for unvaccinated workers to carry out the required work.
- The de-designation of the facilities allows for unvaccinated workers to carry out the work required.
- The facilities will be re-designated as MIFs prior to receiving any further returnees.

4.3 Schedule of Reviews

4.3.1 Four Points Managed Isolation Walk (MIW) incident

- The Managed Isolation Facility (MIF) Four Points conducted a MIW on 30 April 2021. A bus monitor accidentally seated people too closely together. Realising the error, he made an assessment that there was a higher risk to IP&C by moving the returnees than leaving them where they were. All other procedures were complied with: CCTV photo, seat recording, room number recording, and cohorting.
- Comprehensive remedial actions have been taken and advice given across the MIFs where the MIW is applicable to ensure that there is a uniformity of process and enhanced, targeted training for the staff.

4.3.2 Update on investigations – Grand Mercure and Grand Millennium

Grand Mercure

- The Grand Mercure joint incident review is being reviewed and will be provided to your office once finalised.
- The findings of the Grand Mercure ventilation review (prioritised as part of the wider Ventilation Review) have been reviewed by the hotel. The hotel has provided a formal response detailing their maintenance proposal and have indicated this work commenced 3 May 2021 and is expected to take around two to three weeks.

Grand Millennium

Ventilation Review (prioritised as part of the wider Ventilation Review)

- The results from the Independent Qualified Persons (IQP) assessment have been received.
- The MBIE internal analysis of the onsite assessment testing by the Building Systems Performance (BSP) team is in progress. This will be closely followed by the independent HVAC Engineer review of the findings.
- These findings with an initial view of the hotel's response will be presented to the TAG for consideration.

4.3.3 MIQ Facilities Ventilation Review

• The MBIE-led onsite testing of ventilation systems is completed for all sites.

- 26 of 31 sites have provided full or provisional onsite test results to MBIE.
- MBIE have prepared written test results for 20 of the 26 sites. The HVAC Engineer has reviewed all 20 reports and has completed summary reports for 17 of the sites, with the remaining 3 partially complete pending additional testing detail / clarification from the IQP.

4.3.4 KPMG Audit

- KPMG have submitted a draft audit report into their Review of the testing compliance by First Security and Case B. It is being fact checked with the Ministry of Health and First Security before being finalised, provided to your office and then proactively released.
- We have already made a suite of changes which should ensure this does not occur again.

4.3.5 Rapid Assessment, completed by Murray Jack and Katherine Corrich

- Finalised date of proactive release TBC in May in coordination with your Office.
- A briefing will be provided next week to your Office on the action plan to address the key recommendations in the report.
- We will then proactively release this report.

4.4 Policy update

4.4.1 Saliva testing implementation

- MoH will provide a full briefing on the introduction of saliva testing next week. In the interim, we are working with MoH to work through the operational issues which would arise from a widespread roll out of saliva testing in the immediate future. We have met with Health to agree next steps and a way forward, given successful rollout will require extensive crossagency working over the next several months. This initial discussion covered the high-level operational implications of saliva testing, to inform implementation planning work Health are undertaking. The next step is a cross-agency workshop which will include Transport and Customs. Given that the roll out will have significant operational implications for their workforces.
- At this stage the proposal is to include saliva testing on a 7-day testing cycle, enabling one of the required nasopharyngeal swabs to be replaced by regular saliva testing (every 2-3 days). MBIE is comfortable with this as a starting point, however we have raised significant operational concerns if a wider rollout is escalated too quickly, focused in the main around system and process design, and the implications for workers and PCBUs. With the varying border worker types, we will need to work through what saliva testing will mean for each group (e.g. for MIQ, workers/visitors/contractors), and how different working cycles and adhoc attendance is factored in. We are unclear at this stage as to how this change will be factored into BWTR, and integrated with broader systems, given the rise in information flow.
- We will work closely with Health to progress their implementation planning work, following this contributing to design and implementation activities.





- 5.1 Key Issues Being Considered by the Executive Board
- 5.1.1 Border Executive Board meeting

The Border Executive Board met on 13 May.

5.1.2 Border Workforce

- Most MIQ and government agency border staff have received two doses of the COVID-19 vaccination.
- Agencies, including the Ministry of Health, are working closely together to identify and resolve barriers to vaccination. As an example, the Ministry of Health is developing a process by which new border employees can be prioritised for vaccination. This needs to be easily understood by all border employers, applicable to all District Health Boards, and also be relevant when the national appointment system is in place.
- The enhancement to the Border Worker Testing Register (BWTR) on 13 May will show the
 vaccination status of all border workers who are subject to the Vaccinations Order. This means
 PCBUs will be able to use the full functionality of the BWTR system to view their workers'
 vaccination and testing status, as well as a broader overview with management reporting.
- The quality of the process will remain reliant on the Ministry of Health receiving regular updated workforce lists with comprehensive details that can support automated matches to National Health Index data.
- The Ministry of Transport is leading the development of advice on expanding COVID-19 vaccination requirements to other workers at the border performing specified work.

5.1.3 Quarantine Free Travel - Maritime Domain

- An interagency workshop was held on 6 May 21 to progress advice on quarantine free travel
 within the maritime domain. Considerations included: risks and benefits; legal and operational
 requirements; and addressing the differences between the air and maritime borders.
- A briefing paper will be provided to your office by 17 May 21.

5.1.4 Travellers from Very High Risk Countries - Implementation of Measures

- On 10 May, agencies met for the seventh time to consider the implementation of risk mitigation measures for travellers from very high risk countries (currently India, Pakistan, Papua New Guinea, and Brazil).
- Whilst agencies reported no issues, they also noted that there were very few travellers from very high risk countries arriving in New Zealand. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade continues to monitor the availability of commercial travel options for New Zealand citizens and their families from very high risk countries.

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2. COVID-19 Insights

2.1 Insights of Note

2.1.1 Flight Arrivals and Departures




Figure 1: International Flight Arrivals and Departures - 19 April to 16 May By Week

For the period 19 April to 18 May (following the opening of Quarantine Free Travel with Australia), there were a total of 89,234 arrivals to New Zealand, and 77,067 departures. There were 12,167 more passenger arrivals than departures over the period. This is illustrated in figure 1.

2.1.2 Upcoming Flights

There are 761 commercial flights² scheduled to arrive into New Zealand in the next three weeks (from 21 May to 10 June 2021) as shown in figure 2. On average, this is made up of 31 flights per day from Australia, 2 from the Pacific, and 4 from Asia.

3. Ministry of Health Weekly Report

3.1 Policy/Programme Updates



3.1.1 COVID-19 Vaccine and Immunisation Programme

As at 18 May 2021, 474,435 vaccinations have been delivered, including 152,933 people who are fully vaccinated. Of those fully vaccinated 9 percent are Māori, 6 percent are Pasifika, and 19 percent are Asian. 94 sites were active on 18 May 2021.

The allocation plan for the next seven days is for 72,874 doses across New Zealand.

General practice and pharmacy rollout

Dr Samantha Murton, President of the Royal New Zealand College of General Practitioners, participated in a joint media session with the Director-General of Health on 13 May 2021. They outlined to the public and sector how general practice and community pharmacy will participate in the COVID-19 Vaccine and Immunisation Programme (CVIP).

Mass vaccination events

The Ministry of Health continues to work with events company Auckland Unlimited to develop guidance for district health boards (DHBs) on running a mass vaccination event. Workstreams from across the programme are supporting this work to provide national guidance and tools. Considerations for mass vaccination events include how they could be used to target certain populations, how to get high throughput to alleviate some pressure off larger DHBs, and whether such an event could be used to create a strong national focus on the commencement of Group 4.

The Northern Regional Health Co-ordination Centre is in the planning phase for its first mass vaccination event. Decisions on venue and date are not confirmed but the first event could be in late June 2021. This could be used as a trial run before we move to scale immunisation.

Post-event monitoring

The Programme Steering Group has agreed in principle to the implementation of an active monitoring system for pharmacovigilance. Work is underway to identify a digital solution and the subsequent development of an implementation plan.

Vaccination of border workers - maritime

The Ministry of Health is actively working with DHB operational leads on the urgent need to support vaccination of port workers. Collaborative planning with DHBs, Person Conducting a Business or Undertaking (PCBUs), and the Ministry of Transport is essential to ensure that accessible and effective options for vaccination of port workforce can be implemented.

Equity

Investment to support Māori COVID-19 vaccine rollout

Contract negotiations have begun with DHBs for the second tranche funding of \$24.5 million (of total \$39 million) to establish a support service around the vaccination rollout and help whānau to navigate the vaccine and wider health services. Tumu Whakarae will oversee the distribution of funds from their respective DHBs, which will provide a line of sight on which Māori providers are funded.

Disability

As at 10 May 2021, DHBs have received the detailed information from providers of disability support services with Group 2b clients (people receiving residential or similar services) to support operational delivery for those with complex needs.

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Technology

Last week was a big week in technology with the go-live of two new systems:

- the National Immunisation Booking System is in pilot at two Auckland sites with more than 800 appointments made
- the new Whakarangaroa Aotearoa customer relationship management system, which enables a much better customer experience for those calling about immunisation, was rolled out to more than 400 users.

Workforce

As of 18 May 2021, 5,477 vaccinators have completed COVID-19 vaccinator training and 2,037 vaccinators have actively vaccinated in the programme so far.

Following your consideration of HR *Covid-19 Vaccinator Workforce: Amendment to Medicines Regulations* 1984' the draft Cabinet paper was provided to your office earlier this week with the final Cabinet paper expected to be lodged on 20 May 2021 for Cabinet on 24 May 2021.

A draft Cabinet paper regarding proposed changes to the Medicines Regulations to enable currently non-regulated workers to become COVID-19 vaccinators was sent to Ministers on 18 May 2021.

The statutory consultation to seek input on the proposal to make changes to the Medicines Regulations 1984 commenced on 13 May 2021 and closed on 18 May 2021. 103 submissions were received. We are still reviewing the feedback, but early indications suggest no 'show stopper' concerns.

Approximately 75 percent of the submissions support the proposal, with particularly strong support from Māori and disability advocates.

We have completed two pilot programmes with Māori Health Providers (one in Auckland and the other in the Waikato) for the training developed by the Immunisation Advisory Centre (IMAC) and CareerForce for this workforce. Both have gone well, with positive feedback and only minor adjustments to the programme approach.

Distribution and inventory management

As at end of day 18 May 2021, we have made 752 deliveries to sites across the country. This equates to delivery of 80,454 vials or 482,724 doses.

In addition to building a bespoke supply model for each region, the focus this week for CVIP Logistics includes the design of detailed end-to-end business processes across four key domains — order fulfilment, logistics and distribution, inventory management, and supply and demand management. This work is critical to establish a robust and future proofed model for national vaccine delivery at scale.

Communications

The first of a series of commercials targeting the Māori community started on television last week. The campaign proposition of 'Be a doer, Karawhiua!', is woven throughout the www.Karawhiua.nz website, and will play out across television as well as on radio and digital channels as the campaign continues to roll out.

Campaign content targeting the Pasifika community started on 16 May 2021, and includes community activation, followed by an advertising campaign that will begin from 24 May 2021. This will include radio, outdoor advertising, various digital channels and on television. The campaign proposition is 'Let's journey for each other', which encourages Pacific people to take action and get vaccinated, for each other.

Rollout of the vaccine to Polynesia

Cook Islands

The confirmed date for the start of vaccine rollout in the Cook Islands is 20 May 2021 (New Zealand time). Leading up to this, we are expecting on 18 May 2021 (NZT) for Vaccines to arrive in the Cook Islands from New Zealand and 19 May 2021 (NZT) - 'Wet run' – vaccination of vaccinators.

The Immunisation Advisory Centre arrived in the Cook Islands on 10 May 2021 to provide vaccinator training and accredit their cold chain storage.

Niue

We are planning to deliver vaccines in early June 2021 in order for Niue to complete their vaccine rollout by mid-July 2021, at the latest. We estimate it will take five weeks for vaccine rollout in Niue (two weeks for each dose). The current target date is 2 June 2021. Weekly meetings with the Niue health officials will track progress.

Tokelau

We are working with Tokelau on planning of the vaccine rollout. At this stage we anticipate the rollout to commence in July 2021 with support from the New Zealand Defence Force.

Next steps

We will provide you with a further update in the next Weekly Report

3.2 Technical Advisory Group: Update

The COVID-19 Vaccine Technical Advisory Group (CVTAG) met on 11 May 2021. The key points that were discussed were:

- **Pfizer vaccine**: It was noted that the FDA has extended emergency use authorisation for the Pfizer vaccine to include ages 12 to 15, and that Medsafe is expecting adolescent trial data from Pfizer shortly for expansion of provisional approval in New Zealand.
- Vaccine rollout: An update was provided to CVTAG on the current vaccine rollout in New Zealand. A
 minor possible upcoming choke point is the arrival of the next batch of vaccines in June 2021 coinciding
 with higher demand from expanding eligibility to Group 3. Doses need to be reserved for those
 receiving their second dose and for emergency purposes. The Government is working proactively on
 developing communications around this matter. The Ministry of Health has also been working with
 primary care colleagues to establish primary vaccination centres that can participate in the wider
 vaccine rollout.
- Adverse event reporting: The post-event workstream provided an update on the adverse event
 reporting process, including work that is being undertaken towards an uplift to the Centre for Adverse
 Reactions Monitoring system, and the development of a clinical protocol for the management of
 consumers who experience an adverse event following the first dose. It was noted that the
 implementation of an active monitoring system has been approved in principle, with further work
 underway on this. CVTAG noted that the active monitoring system is key to building community
 confidence in the vaccine and to increase uptake. There was strong support from CVTAG for the active
 short message service-based reporting system to be implemented immediately.

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- Vaccination during an outbreak: CVTAG's advice was sought on ring vaccination as a strategy in New Zealand. CVTAG noted that there are practical difficulties associated with delivering a true ring vaccination approach in the setting of COVID-19 and, as such, a more 'targeted vaccination' should be adopted during an outbreak. Targeted vaccination should be implemented alongside other public health measures and not as a standalone measure, and a protocol should be developed and ready for implementation if we have an outbreak. CVTAG endorsed the approach of targeted vaccination and the development of a protocol to guide the implementation of ring vaccination as part of the contingency plan for such a scenario.
- Timing of flu vaccine: There was a discussion about whether the Ministry of Health can endorse that
 it is acceptable to have a four week gap between two doses of the Pfizer vaccine, following questions
 received via the Immunisation Advisory Centre 0800 line on the timing of the flu vaccine. It was noted
 that changing the Ministry of Health's view on the interval between doses would have significant
 implications for the booking system, the COVID-19 Immunisation Register, and distribution and volume
 planning. The current public messaging is that doses should be spaced at least 21 days apart.

The COVID-19 Technical Advisory Group (TAG) did not meet in the week commencing 10 May 2021. The next TAG meeting is scheduled for 28 May 2021.

4. Managed Isolation and Quarantine Weekly Report



4.1 Top Items to Note

4.1.1 Staff testing update - compliance statistics for 10 - 16 May 2021

- Reporting from Border Working Testing Register (BWTR) shows that 4,128 people undertook work in our facilities last week and of these:
 - 3,831 were compliant with their obligations;
 - 210 were overdue; and
 - 87 were still to have their NHI-matched.
- Of those that were NHI-matched, 95% were compliant and 5% were overdue.
- Of the 5% of workers (210) that were non-compliant, the majority (187) have had a previous swab and 23 were recorded as not having had a swab. It is likely that some of them have been swabbed but it is not showing up in BWTR at this time.
- Of the 210 non-compliant workers, 48 are overdue by 6 to 9 days, 110 are overdue by 10+ days.
- Workforce Testing Advisors are now getting more detailed reports showing workers who are non-compliant; it includes detail on what the non-compliance looks like (e.g. overdue swab by number of days, no swab, or no NHI match). This allows the team to prioritise follow ups with employers and PCBUs based on the public health risk. For example, the team are focussing on those workers over due for a swab by 10+ days, rather than those only 0-2 days overdue (as those workers may have been swabbed but the data is still being uploaded into BWTR).
- From what Advisors are hearing through their follow-ups there seems to be some confusion
 for employers and PCBUs around tests after a worker's last shift (i.e. they will no longer be
 working on MIQ sites), we are looking at how we can improve messaging to clear up that
 confusion.
- Following the ransomware attack on the Waikato DHB, we have been notified that there have been delays in swab testing impacting the results of border workers in MIQ. This delay will impact next week's compliance report as Waikato based workers may not have their swab data updated in BWTR.

4.1.2 Vaccination of frontline staff update

- Employers are still working through employment processes with 17 unvaccinated workers, and these workers are not able to work in the MIQF while this process is occurring.
- As at 19 May 2021, 13% of the MIQ Workforce are yet to receive the second dose of the vaccination.
- BWTR was updated with the vaccination data of all workers who fall under Schedule 2 of the Vaccination Order as at 13 May 2021. New MIQ Vaccination Certificates will be issued every 2-3 days from this point to cover new workers, and workers who have now had their second dose.
- According to BWTR, the total number of unvaccinated workers on site was 161 (4% of the
 workforce). Follow up on these records showed that workers were vaccinated, but NHI
 matching issues and integration issues between BWTR and CIR mean this data is not being
 pulled through to BWTR to complete assurance reporting. MoH have advised they are working
 on the issue and it estimated to be fixed within 3 weeks.
- Last week a total of 3 people applied for an exception to enter a MIF. Of these, 2 were approved and 1 was declined. The 2 approved were for the Pullman hotel, to fix the freezer

- so food wouldn't spoil, and the Holiday Inn Auckland, for an interpreter as the original person got injured. The declined exception was at the Sebel for a person to fix the external CCTV.
- For the period 13 to 20 May 2021, there have been three occasions where unvaccinated contactors were allowed by gate security to enter the site. Upon management identifying the error, the contractors were removed from the site and we have re-educated gate security staff on the proof of vaccination requirements to enter the site.

4.1.3 MIQ Leadership Forum

- MBIE hosted the inaugural MIQ cross agency Leadership Forum last week, with 70 attendees from various organisations across the MIQ system.
- Approximately 350 others joined the sessions via videoconference.
- Day one focused on where we have come from and what the future might look like with speakers from our DHBs on specific issues they have faced over the past year and international speakers on their issues to date and thoughts for the future.
- The second day was focused on workshopping current and future issues.
- Key outcomes from the forum were:
 - A desire to foster a "one MIQ team" culture across the agencies;
 - fostering a just culture for staff, continuing to focus on system improvements;
 - focus on supporting the workforce; and
 - further focus on engaging with our communities.

4.2 Operational update

4.2.1 Capacity update

- From early March to present, over 71,250 returnees from over 180 countries have secured a voucher to return home during the period of March through to the end of September 2021.
- As at 7am 19 May 2021, there were over 2,700 rooms available for the period of May through to September 2021, spread across all months.
- While a few dates remain available in late May, June and early July 2021, they are now very limited.

4.2.2 Adjustment to MIQ operating capacity

- Previously, we have been reporting in the publicly released daily snapshot a 4,000 room operating capacity following the decision to offline 500 rooms for the initial QFT period.
- More recently we have been operating at a lower capacity due to the planned ongoing maintenance work, cohorting adjustments as well as both the Grand Mercure and Grand Millennium being offline.
- We will begin to report on the revised figure of 3,100 from next week.
- We will continue to adjust this as changes to our capacity are made to ensure a more accurate reflection of our capacity is released publicly and that the commentary in the daily snapshot explains the rationale for any adjustment when it is made.
- We will also be re-looking at the format of the daily snapshot and will keep your office informed about this work.

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4.2.3 Ombudsman update

- The Ombudsman visited the M Social facility this week, on Wednesday 19 May 2021.
- There are currently five open OPCAT matters, four of which are provisional reports (for Commodore Christchurch, Grand Mercure Wellington, Novotel Christchurch, and SO Hotel) and one is a final report (for the Four Points Auckland).

4.2.4 Security Enhancement Programme

- MBIE have employed 31 MBIE Operations and Security Managers, 15 MBIE Security Officers, and one Regional Operations and Security Manager. Three Regional Operations and Security Managers have been appointed.
- 158 MBIE Security Officers are to be recruited and expected to be on boarded by the end of July 2021.
- Security Officers will be on board in the Christchurch region from 8 June 2021, followed closely by Hamilton, Rotorua and Auckland.
- MBIE Security Officers are being supplied with an MBIE branded uniform.

4.2.5 Air filtration units update

- There are two types of filtration units that are being installed in the MIF's. One type is being installed in shared spaces (e.g. lifts and corridors) and HEPA only filters that are being installed in particular rooms (e.g. swabbing and returnee rooms).
- With the HEPA only units (being installed in rooms) there is a world-wide shortage as there is an overwhelming demand due to COVID-19. Due to limited availability of the units they are being installed where most urgently required i.e. in swabbing rooms.
- With the units that are being installed in the common areas within the MIF's, the delays are due to port congestion and international shipping constraints, as opposed to the supplier not being able to meet demand.
- Alternative units have been considered, however have a six-month lead time. The Ministry of
 Health will seek to expedite the units through the ports to allow the roll out to continue as
 soon as possible.

4.3 Schedule of Reviews

4.3.1 Update on investigations - Grand Mercure and Grand Millennium

Grand Mercure

- We are working on the proactive release of the Grand Mercure joint incident review.
- The Grand Mercure ventilation maintenance work will be complete end of May 2021.

Grand Millennium

- The Grand Millennium incident review has been sent to the Minister's office.
- Grand Millennium onsite ventilation testing is complete. Waiting on a response from hotel in relation to addressing the findings and once received will be presented to MIQ TAG.

4.3.2 MIQ Facilities Ventilation Review

26 of 31 sites have provided full or provisional onsite test results to MBIE.

• The Ventilation group (VWG) have reviewed the reports for 18 sites.

4.4 Large Group Arrivals Update

Fijian Rugby team

The Public Health Risk Assessment has been delayed due to a lack of information from New Zealand Rugby/Fiji Rugby Union. Urgent work is underway to confirm these details in order to complete the assessment. This information is critical to inform the health exemption, which is required to train while in isolation as the team will play the All Blacks on 10 and 17 July 2021. A delay in receiving information also delays final logistical arrangements as they are reliant on final bubble confirmation.

RSE

The deadlines for Industry to meet MIQ planning deadlines for first two flights are quickly approaching. The first flight details are required by Monday 24 May 2021 to meet the 21 June 2021 arrival. It is unclear as to whether or not the industry can meet these and whether there will be any arrivals on 21 June 2021. Any delays to confirmation will disrupt MIQ cohort planning for Hamilton and significant pressure will be placed on delivery teams if key planning deadlines are allowed to slip to accommodate industry.

Industry have stated that they cannot provide a single counterparty for the Crown Services Agreement (required to charge for the additional services). A single counterparty for the Crown Services Agreement was set out in the letter from Ministers sent earlier in the week. They have suggested that all employers be contracted and invoiced separately, but due to the large number of employers within the individual groups, as well as details not being confirmed until close to arrival, this will pose a significant administrative and financial burden on MIQ (from both a contractual and invoicing perspective). If contract negotiations continue to be delayed, Crown will not be able to charge for the additional costs. For the RSE group who entered this year, there was no Crown Services Agreement,

but one industry body was responsible for being invoiced and they managed the on-charging to employers themselves.

Russian mariners

MIQ has been notified by the fishing companies lawyer that a further group of up to 32 fishermen have been booked in via MIAS, and are due to arrive in New Zealand on 3 June 2021. MIQ Group arrivals will manage this group in accordance with other group arrivals to ensure risks are appropriately mitigated. This will include pre-departure communication (to be sent through the lawyer), notification that pre-departure measures have been met, and in-person translators while in the MIF. Work is also underway to explore options for charging additional costs. We will be providing your office with a briefing on this [2021-3801 Management of cohorts who come through MIAS].

Returning Olympians

Issues have arisen with some Olympians returning from Olympic qualifiers. These sportspeople are arriving as regular returnees and do not have exemptions for training. However, some have been making continued requests outside of SOPs, including requesting special rooms that would otherwise be provided for families or individuals with special needs. MIQ is working with Sport NZ to ensure that expectations are carefully managed and no unnecessary pressure is placed on facilities.

4.6 Fees and Waivers

- The weekly update on MIQ fees and waivers is not available this week due to technical system issues.
- Work is underway to implement a new system to streamline and improve the invoicing system.
- It is anticipated that the initial phase of the establishment of the reporting system will be completed by 31 May 2021.
- This includes a data platform to enable matching of data across multiple data sets and transition of weekly reporting over to MBIE Finance.
- Finance are considering alternative metrics for reporting. There will be engagement with your office as to the types of information you would like to receive going forward.
- Work continues to streamline and strengthen the system while the new platform is developed.

4.7 Emergency Allocation Applications

- 3,230 applications have been processed since 30 Oct 2020.
- 19 applications were received in the week ending 16 May 2021 and 8 applications were processed.
- From the applications processed in the week ending 16 May 2021, 88% of the applications were approved.



- Average number of complaints received each week since the start of MIQ is 108. For the last 4 weeks the average is 56 per week.
- This week we have received 62 new cases and have resolved 32 cases.
- Of these complaints 53% were about facilities, 47% were about fee waivers and there was a slight increase in MIAS/voucher complaints. All other complaint types remained steady.

5. Border Executive Board Report



5.1 Key Issues Being Considered by the Executive Board

5.1.1 Border Workforce

- Police have successfully completed a large border staff rotation (150) in compliance with border testing and vaccination requirements.
- Agencies, including Ministry of Health, continue working closely together to identify and resolve barriers to vaccination. As an example, Health has developed and promulgated a process map with points of contact to facilitate new border employees and their household contacts prioritisation for vaccination.
- The latest upgrade of the Border Workforce Testing Register (BWTR) allows more employers
 to see which of their workers have been vaccinated (specifically those who did not consent to
 share this information with their employer). Border agencies continue to work with MOH
 officials to improve and refine the BWTR.
- In addition to MIQ, as at 18 May 2021, there were 201 PCBUs in the BWTR.

5.1.2 Quarantine Free Travel - Cook Islands

- Two-way quarantine free travel with the Cooks Islands began on 17 May with 297 passengers departing Auckland to Rarotonga on 18 May on the first flight.
- Pre-departure checks by Customs' Passenger Targeting Unit identified two passengers who
 had booked but did not meet the eligibility requirements of having spent 14 days in
 New Zealand prior to departure. Neither passenger checked in for the 18 May departure flight.

5.1.3 Travellers from Very High-Risk Countries - Implementation of Measures

- On 17 May, agencies met for the eighth time to consider the implementation of risk mitigation measures for travellers from very high-risk countries (currently India, Pakistan, Papua New Guinea, and Brazil).
- An interagency meeting was held on 18 May to discuss developing an update for Ministers by
 21 May on travel from very high-risk countries, particularly India.

5.1.4 Travel Health Pass

- The Border Executive Board is working with other agencies to ensure overlapping work
 programmes are aligned and coordinated, with roles and responsibilities clear. Such work
 programmes include Ministry of Health's vaccination certificate work, and DPMC's
 reconnecting with the world programme.
- The Border Executive Board's interest is in how travellers at the border can transact any required health credential and, eventually, the impact on Managed Isolation and Quarantine demand.
- Advice will be provided to Ministers by the end of June 2021.

2. COVID-19 Insights

2.1 Insights of Note

2.1.1 Vaccine Hesitancy and Misinformation

The phenomena of **vaccine hesitancy** has existed since vaccination began. The term was defined in the 2000s and refers to a delay in acceptance, or refusal of vaccines despite availability. It sits on the spectrum between **vaccine acceptance** (people who are willing to be vaccinated) and **vaccine refusal** (those who will not be vaccinated).¹

Vaccine hesitancy has three subcomponents that interrelate but are also separate; vaccine complacency, vaccine confidence, and vaccine convenience, see figure 1.

Vaccine complacency relates to the perceived risk of infectious diseases as being low.

Vaccine confidence relates to the lack of trust in the vaccine or the institutions that recommend vaccination (e.g. health authorities, governments, or pharmaceutical industry).


Vaccine convenience relates to barriers, which may be real or perceived, in accessing the vaccine.²

Misinformation and disinformation can contribute to the three areas of vaccine hesitancy. The current narratives of COVID-19

misinformation and disinformation in New Zealand are mostly related to vaccine confidence. Many of these narratives are woven into larger themes centred around mistrust of government, elites,³ or international businesses, (often referred to as conspiracy theories);⁴ or concerns about side effects, medical safety, and long-term effects of the vaccine.⁵

Social media platforms (e.g. Facebook and YouTube) are the most common⁶ means of disseminating vaccine misinformation and disinformation in New Zealand.⁷

In New Zealand recent research shows that 46% of people have come across messages encouraging them not to get the COVID-19 vaccine. 8 60% of these messages came via Facebook. 9 This has led to 13% of people identifying as less likely to get the vaccine due to this exposure. 10

The recent Ministry of Health Horizon poll¹¹ indicates that the main concerns of New Zealanders regarding the COVID-19 vaccine are safety concerns, long-term effects, and side effects;¹² and misinformation can target such concerns.

Misinformation and disinformation must be appropriately targeted. Official engagement can be counterproductive if the message, and those delivering it, are not trusted by the recipients; or the circumstances are not culturally, or socially appropriate. ¹³ People who are hesitant to take a vaccine can become **vaccine acceptant** if their issues and concerns regarding vaccination are addressed.

There is ongoing work across government on these topics. Further information is available if required.

3. Ministry of Health Weekly Report

3.1 Policy/Programme Updates



3.1.1 COVID-19 Vaccine and Immunisation Programme

As at 25 May 2021, 562,149 vaccinations have been delivered, including 191,106 people who are fully vaccinated. Of those fully vaccinated, nine percent are Māori, six percent are Pasifika, and 19 percent are Asian. 108 sites were active on 25 May 2021.

The allocation plan for the next seven days is for 82,679 doses across New Zealand.

General practice and pharmacy rollout

Implementation planning across the entire end to end process is well underway with a tabletop exercise held with the primary care sector this week to discuss milestones and receive feedback. The payments solution is due to be ready at the end of June 2021. DHBs are tasked with engaging primary care providers to ensure access across their area and to assist in vaccination distribution planning.

Office of the Auditor General report

The Office of the Auditor General released its report on preparations for the nationwide rollout of the COVID-19 Vaccine on 18 May 2021. The report made six recommendations. The Ministry of Health has responded to those recommendations and issued a media release and a more detailed response document following the release of the final report. Two of the six recommendations have already been implemented, while four are currently in progress.

Mass vaccination events

The Northern Regional Health Co-ordination Centre is in the planning phase for its first mass vaccination event, which will be held at the Vodafone Events Centre in South Auckland from 2 to 4 July 2021, with a further event planned for late July 2021 to administer the second doses of the vaccine. A mass vaccination event is defined as having 5,000+ throughput per day.

Equity

Māori COVID-19 vaccine rollout delivery and investment

Over 36,387 Māori have received their first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine, which represents 10 percent of the total population who have received their first dose as at 25 May 2021.

The applications to the Ministry of Health's Māori Communications Fund have now closed. Fifty-seven applications were received, representing 140 organisations, requesting a total of \$3,749,500.

Disability

Tātou Whaikaha, the disability advisory group to the programme, met last week. The Group discussed feedback on the workforce programme and reviewed feedback on externally developed training and tools to support individuals with anxiety, phobias and other behaviours which might preclude or reduce likelihood of a safe and effective vaccination experience.

Technology

The new "COVID Population Identification and Registration" system will go-live by the end of May 2021 to enable automatic NHI matching for 70 percent of appointments and greatly streamlining welcoming people at vaccination centres.

The new distribution and inventory system is on track for release on 8 June 2021. This will streamline distribution and ordering, provide greater visibility of vaccine supply throughout the country and enable scaling for Group 4.

The new Centre for Adverse Reaction Monitoring workflow application to assess adverse events following immunisation is on track to automatically match and merge duplicate records and to prioritise reports for

assessment. These new features will dramatically reduce manual effort without jeopardising assessment quality.

The new system "Hands up to join our Vaccination team" is forecast to go-live by early June 2021. This system will make it easier to match potential workforce with providers, making it faster and simpler to scale the workforce.

Workforce

As of 25 May 2021, 6,110 vaccinators have completed COVID-19 vaccinator training and 2,280 vaccinators have actively vaccinated in the programme so far.

On 24 May 2021, Cabinet discussed amendments to the Medicines Regulations Act 1984 in order to enable the creation of the new workforce of COVID-19 vaccinators. The amendments are planned to be gazetted on 27 May 2021.

For every 1.0 FTE administering the vaccine, the programme's aim is to have three trained COVID-19 vaccinators available. At this stage plans show we will need approximately 6,000 Vaccinators.

Distribution and inventory management

As at end of day 25 May 2021, we have made 849 deliveries to sites across the country. This equates to delivery of 95,844 vials or 575,064 doses.

To mitigate the key risks of the current manual business processes and to enable functions to scale, the Ministry is commissioning two additional salesforce modules – a location module and an order and inventory module – within the COVID Immunisation Register (CIR).

The location module will automate the registering and onboarding of new vaccination sites while the order and inventory module will automate the order fulfilment and inventory management functions to ensure safe and efficient management of the vaccine at scale.

Communications

This week we undertook proactive media to mark the 500,000th vaccination milestone and release of key insights from the latest Horizon research. It has been pleasing to see social media insights indicating that there is a high degree of positive experiences after receiving the vaccine and a lot of praise for the vaccination teams within the community.

Recent activities and engagement with ports

Conversations between the Ministry of Health and unions are helping to identify priority areas for engagement and highlight extremely wide-ranging levels of uptake across different sites.

While being mindful of the individual and collective employment relationships, the Ministry met with unions on Thursday 27 May to canvass concerns and agree to a shared forward plan.

The Ministry is also beginning to explore framing the conversation differently, shifting it from a health-policy and compliance conversation to a commercial one with a vaccinated workforce as a potential commercial advantage. We will continue to refine these strategies. In the meantime, improved measures to address access issues are well underway in key sites as outlined below.

- Hawkes Bay: the DHB ran vaccination sites at Napier Port in March 2021 and April 2021 to vaccinate the port workers under a testing order. Any additional port workers are able to be vaccinated at a "The Doctors Napier" clinic which is a practice sub-contracted to provide COVID-19 swabbing and who partnered with HBDHB for the on-port vaccination centre. This clinic is approximately 2km from the port.
- Southern DHB: estimate over 80% coverage at clinics for port workers. Household contacts of this cohort were completed at Wakari site (Dunedin) and Murihiku Marae (Invercargill) during the same period. In Southland all port workers have access to public vaccination clinics and are having their vaccines prioritised. South Port (and Tiwai) are 27km from the Victoria Rooms vaccination clinic in Central Invercargill and Port Otago is 13km from the Meridian Mall clinic in central Dunedin.

- Taranaki DHB: Port workers are able to ring the DHB booking centre and are a continuing priority for the DHB. Taranaki are currently vaccinating at the DHB site on David Street, New Plymouth which is approximately 3.5 km from the port.
- Bay of Plenty DHB: Further engagement and Q&A sessions have been scheduled with the Port of Tauranga for next Friday (4 June), at multiple time slots to cover shift changes. These sessions are being collectively supported by stevedore employers, union reps, and the local DHB clinical team.

Rollout of the vaccine to Polynesia

Cook Islands

Vaccination in the Cook Islands started last week with the first delivery of Pfizer 'Comirnaty' vaccine flown in on Air New Zealand's first two-way 'quarantine-free travel' flight to Rarotonga on 18 May 2021.

Niue

Plans are well under way for Niue to commence its vaccination from 9 June 2021. Formal approval for Pfizer dose donation to Niue is now sought from Vaccine Ministers.

Tokelau

Delivery of vaccine to Tokelau is a difficult logistical exercise. Logistics and planning experts from the New Zealand Defence Force (NZDF) are conducting the tactical planning to explore a number of entry points into Tokelau, such as Samoa, American Samoa and the Cook Islands. This may involve tasking naval and air assets from NZDF to ensure we are able to transport the vaccine to Tokelau.

Next steps

We will provide you with a further update in the next Weekly Report.

3.2 Technical Advisory Group: Update

The COVID-19 Technical Advisory Group (TAG) did not meet in the week commencing 17 May 2021. The next TAG meeting is scheduled for 25 May 2021.

The COVID-19 Vaccine Technical Advisory Group (CVTAG) did not meet in the week commencing 17 May 2021. The next CVTAG meeting is scheduled for 25 May 2021. New Zealand was in listening mode and did not deliver any statements during the meeting.

3.3 33rd Commonwealth Health Ministers Meeting (20-21 May 2021)

This item updates you on the **Commonwealth Health Ministers' Meeting**, which was held on 20 to 21 May 2021. As previously advised, New Zealand was represented by the Ministry of Health (an approach that is consistent with Australia and other countries).

The meeting was chaired by India's Minister for Health and Family Welfare. The theme of the meeting was "Commonwealth Response to COVID-19: Ensuring Equitable Access to Vaccines and Building Resilience for Health Systems and Emergencies". During the meeting Fiji provided a statement on behalf of the Pacific region in which it thanked Australia and New Zealand (along with countries who had contributed to COVAX) for their assistance with vaccine supply.

Other notable comments during the meeting were made by Australia and Canada:

- Australia called for countries to work through "globally appropriate multilateral mechanisms" naming
 the World Health Organisation (WHO) as the premier vehicle to carry pandemic preparedness
 programmes forward. (This was in reference to the challenges the Commonwealth has in remaining
 focused on a role that complements/does not duplicate the WHO. The Ministry supports this comment.)
- Canada spoke on the need to strengthen the International Health Regulations, and said that the "hugely important" International Panel on Pandemic Preparedness and Response would help countries learn the lessons that need to be learned, and try to ensure that this is the last pandemic (the Ministry also supports Canada in this respect).

Your office has received a copy

of the outcomes statement from the meeting.

Next steps

We will provide further information on the meeting if requested. As the Commonwealth Health Ministers Meeting tends to be a low priority for New Zealand, no further substantive engagement is planned.

3.4 Publication of fortnightly COVID-19 Disease Indicator Summary Report

The Ministry of Health plans to release the most recent fortnightly COVID-19 disease indicator summary report (indicator report) on the Ministry's website covering the period 23 April 2021 to 6 May 2021.

The indicator report was developed based on the recommendations in the Rapid Audit of Contact Tracing for COVID-19 in New Zealand. It provides an end-to-end view of the public health response to COVID-19 for cases and close contacts.

Key points of interest for this indicator report are:

- this period involves no community cases and associated contacts. Consequently, all metrics for community
 cases in this reporting period have no available data
- there were 33 cases in managed isolation and quarantine facilities during this period.

Next steps

The report will be released on the Ministry of Health's website during the week of 24 May 2021.

4. Managed Isolation and Quarantine Weekly Report



4.1 Top Items to Note

- 4.1.1 Staff testing update compliance statistics for 17-23 May 2021
 - As noted in last week's report, following the ransomware attack on the Waikato DHB, there have been delays in swab testing impacting the results of border workers in MIQ. This delay has impacted

this week's compliance figures as Waikato based workers may not have their swab data updated in the Border Worker Testing Register (BWTR).

- Reporting from BWTR shows that 4,432 people undertook work in our facilities last week and of these:
 - 3,901 were compliant with their obligations;
 - 481 were overdue (this figure reduces to 279 if you exclude the data for workers at Hamilton facilities, who may be compliant but due to the ransomware attack on the Waikato DHB that data hasn't uploaded into BWTR yet); and
 - 50 were still to have their NHI-matched with 39 of these workers being set up in the BWTR in the last 7 days.
- Of those that were NHI-matched, 89% were compliant and 11% were overdue. However, if you
 exclude workers from Hamilton MIQ facilities from this data then compliance for the rest of the
 country is at 93% and 7% are non-compliant.
- Of the 11% of workers (481) that were non-compliant, the majority (454) have had a previous swab and 27 were recorded as not having had a swab. It is likely that some of them have been swabbed but it is not showing up in BWTR at this time.
- Of the 481 non-compliant workers, 193 are overdue by 6 to 9 days, 164 are overdue by 10+ days.
- Workforce Testing Advisors are now getting more detailed reports showing workers who are non-compliant; it includes detail on what the non-compliance looks like (e.g. overdue swab by number of days, no swab, or no NHI match). This allows the team to prioritise follow ups with employers and PCBUs based on the public health risk. For example, the team are focusing on those workers overdue for a swab by 10+ days, rather than those only 0-2 days overdue (as those workers may have been swabbed but the data is still being uploaded into BWTR).

4.1.2 Vaccination of frontline staff update

- Employers are still working through employment processes with 15 unvaccinated workers, and these workers are not able to work in the MIQF while this process is occurring.
- As at 26 May 2021, 8% of the MIQ Workforce are yet to receive the second dose of the vaccination.
- According to BWTR, the total number of unvaccinated workers on site was 99 (2% of the workforce).
 Follow up on these records showed that all 99 workers were vaccinated, but NHI matching issues and integration issues between BWTR and CIR mean this data is not being pulled through to BWTR to complete assurance reporting.
- Automated updates into BWTR of Worker Vaccination status are not yet available, requiring manual updates from MoH staff until this functionality is delivered in early June 2021.

4.2 Operational update

4.2.1 Capacity update

- From early March to present, over 76,822 returnees from over 180 countries have secured a voucher to return home during the period of March through to the end of October 2021.
- On 25 May 2021 an initial tranche of 1,400 rooms were released in October 2021.
- As at 8am 26 May 2021, there were over 3,285 rooms available for the period of May through to October 2021, spread across all months.
- In the first 24 hours of availability, 350 rooms were secured in October 2021.
- Our operational capacity is currently 3,527 rooms, due to two facilities being offline and scheduled maintenance.

4.2.2 Ombudsman update

- The response to the Ombudsman's final report for the Four Points Auckland facility was submitted to the Ombudsman on Friday 21 May 2021.
- Responses for the Ombudsman's provisional report for the Commodore Christchurch and Grand Mercure Wellington facilities were submitted to the Ombudsman on Monday 24 May 2021.
- We are preparing the responses to the Ombudsman' provisional reports for the SO Hotel and Novotel Christchurch Airport facilities.

4.2.3 Auckland International Airport terminal upgrade

- The upgrade for the International to Domestic (I2D) gate lounge for MIQ charter flights is on track to be completed on time and within budget on 28 May 2021. The first flight through will be the NZ5 with approximately. 125 pax on Monday 31 May 2021.
- The new I2D lounge increases pax numbers on charters from 70 to 135. This means we are able to transfer a higher number of returnees to our regions, further maximising the capacity in these locations.
- A trial for the new I2D liaison service will also start on 31 May 2021. This will involve two Menzies personnel escorting MIQ passengers through Zone B to the I2D gate. This is intended to provide for a much smoother air transfer experience for returnees travelling to Wellington and Christchurch MIFs and mitigate the increased complaints that we have received for this service.
- The baggage reconciliation process to Auckland, Hamilton and Rotorua MIFs is going well with minor refinements being introduced. This new process has greatly reduced the passenger dwell time on buses, which could have been as high as 1.5 2 hours sitting static at Auckland Airport while they waited for their bags to be cleared. Instead returnees are able to depart for their MIFs as coon as their coach is full, with their bags to follow for reconciliation at their MIF.

4.3 Policy update

4.3.1 New timeframe to pay MIQ fees – implementation

- On 17 May 2021 you agreed to progress the following changes to the MIQ fees settings [briefing 2021-3261 refers]:
 - a) Reduce the payment period for MIQ invoices from 90 to 30 days
 - b) Enable MBIE to issue invoices any time after a person enters MIQ (under current settings invoices can only be issued on or after the date a person leaves MIQ)
 - c) Enable MBIE to charge fees to families on the basis of their travel group as registered in MIAS, irrespective of how many rooms they occupy
- Decisions (b) and (c) will require amendments to the MIQ Charges Regulations. We will provide you with further advice on the process and timeline for giving effect to these changes by 11 June 2021. The 11 June 2021 briefing will also provide you with recommendations on additional minor and technical changes to support the smooth application and durability of the fees settings.
- Reducing the payment period for MIQ invoices from 90 to 30 days does not require regulatory change. It is an operational decision enacted by the Chief Executive of MBIE.
- We propose that the new 30-day payment timeframe will apply to MIQ invoices issued on or after 1 September 2021. This date has been selected for the following reasons:
 - It will allow MBIE to provide adequate (three months') notice to prospective returnees about how long they will have to pay their MIQ invoices.

- Work is underway to increase the range of payment options available to returnees. A supplier has
 been engaged to produce a credit card payment platform, and we have also been working to get
 MIQ set up as an online banking bill payment option. We expect these new payment options to
 be live by 1 September 2021.
- MBIE is currently progressing work on a new invoicing system that will semi-automate the processes to determine liability and issue invoices. At the same time Immigration New Zealand is providing data that will fill gaps in the information needed to determine fee liability. No invoices for people who arrived in MIQ from 14 March 2021 are being generated whilst the data is being moved between invoicing platforms. The initial phase of the establishment of the system is on track to be completed by 31 May 2021. When invoicing goes back online, it may generate media interest as some people will be receiving invoices several months after leaving MIQ.
- The 1 September 2021 implementation date will allow time for the backlog of older invoices to be cleared (with the original 90 day payment terms).
- We will prepare communications to ensure that there is widespread awareness of the new 30 day invoice payment terms.

Russians mariners

A group of 26 mariners are scheduled to enter MIQ on 2 June 2021. Arrangements are in place for onsite

The fishing companies will work with MIQ Operations to provide services to support where necessary at
their own expense. An agreement letter has also been sent to the fishing companies to ensure any
additional costs can be recovered if new situations arise.

Fijian rugby team

- Players from the Fijian rugby team are due to enter MIQ on 18 June 2021. Players are coming from the UK,
 France and Fiji. Those in Europe will congregate in Singapore and get a direct flight to Christchurch from
 there. The Fijian-based players are still to confirm flight arrangements but are looking at chartering a direct
 flight into Christchurch and align arrival time as much as possible with the European-based players.
- A public health risk assessment has been completed. Final bubble arrangements are yet to be determined
 and approved. Planning has been delayed due to the late arrival of information from the group, but no
 other issues have arisen.

Manual allocation

In the last package, a number of groups were approved through manual allocation. These groups were not groups in the traditional sense, but rather a series of individual travellers all entering New Zealand for a common purpose. These included: returning Olympians, students and the Construction Accord. All of these groups requested high numbers of manual allocation, based on what they communicated was the need. In practice, all groups have only confirmed small numbers and, in one case, have not used their allocation at all. Further, some agencies continue to request that they confirm numbers at the last minute, which means that there is a high chance that those rooms will be wasted with no way for MIQ to recover those costs. MIQ requests that, at a minimum, final names and numbers be received at least 10 working days before travel. This allows for the MIAS team to release the rooms back into the system and sufficient time for a member of the public to be able to feasibly book and undertake all necessary pre-departure requirements (e.g. a COVID-19 test 72 hours before departure). 



5. Border Executive Board Report



5.1 Key Issues Being Considered by the Board

5.1.1 Border Workforce

- Border employers are following up on the few staff who come under the Vaccinations Order and have not had their second COVID-19 vaccination. These have until the close of 4 June 2021 to receive their second dose or they will not be treated as vaccinated.
- Agencies, including Ministry of Health, continue working closely together to identify and resolve barriers to vaccination.

5.1.2 Travel Health Pass

- Officials working on the Travel Health Pass Work Programme continue to develop advice for Ministers
 on what would be required to stand up a travel health pass and what options the Government could
 undertake.
- Last week, the NZ Customs Service led an inter-agency session on the different component parts of the
 Travel Health Pass work. The interagency group agreed to each component part and who would be the
 respective lead. During that session, there were also initial discussions on different scenarios for how a
 travel health pass could be operated.

7. New Zealand Customs Service and Ministry of Business Innovation and Employment Update on VHRC

NZ Customs and MBIE

7.1 Pathways for People out of Very High-Risk Countries to New Zealand

On 24 April 2021, the New Zealand Government announced its' intent to temporarily suspend entry into New Zealand for passengers who have been in **Very High-Risk Countries** ("VHRCs") within the previous 14 days. There are four countries currently on the VHRC list: Brazil, India, Pakistan, and Papua New Guinea.¹⁴

The suspension does not apply to New Zealand citizens and their immediate family; and other exempt persons (those with diplomatic privileges, NZDF members, aircrew, and humanitarian exemptions).¹⁵

Immigration New Zealand has advised that its border staff are enforcing this through airline check in referrals. ¹⁶ As regards New Zealand residents, this is implemented by reminding airlines of their obligations as Immigration New Zealand does not have legislative power to prevent New Zealand residents from entering New Zealand.

There are three airlines with connections from VHRCs. Qatar Airways, and Emirates Airlines, carry passengers from India, Pakistan, and Brazil.¹⁷ Singapore Airlines carries passengers from Singapore who may have arrived from Papua New Guinea, with a connection from Air Nuigini.¹⁸

The main route to from India to New Zealand¹⁹ is on Qatar Airways via Doha.

The main routes from Brazil to New Zealand are on Qatar Airways, or Emirates, and passengers may be able to get an Electronic System for Travel Authorization (ESTA) to transit through Los Angeles in the United States without a visa; or have a valid United States visa.

The main routes from Pakistan to New Zealand are either Emirates via Dubai; or Qatar Airways via Doha.

The main route from Papua New Guinea to New Zealand is via Singapore Airlines with a connection from Papua New Guinea via Air Nuigini.

Qatar Airways²⁰ arrives three times per week (Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday). Emirates Airlines²¹ arrives six times per week (Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday). Singapore Airlines²² arrives six times per week (Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday).

People from VHRCs could travel to other interim countries prior to departing for New Zealand, which may enable them to travel to New Zealand via different routes. Passengers that may have been in a VHRC but who have travelled to another country prior to departing for New Zealand may not necessarily be captured by airline data as this data is dependent on how that person travelled and/or was ticketed. Examples of this would be if the passenger did not travel by air between some countries before their final point of embarkation or had split ticketing.

9. COVID-19 Independent Continuous Review, Improvement and Advice Group

Continuous Review, Improvement and Advice Group

9.1 Items to Note/Updates

The Group met on Thursday 18 May to fact check and discuss feedback on the COVID-19 Independent Continuous Review, Improvement and Advice Group's draft report on their findings from a review into the Auckland February 2021 outbreak.
