What is the New Zealand Royal Honours system?

The New Zealand royal honours system is a system of orders, decorations and medals, that recognises achievements of, or service by, New Zealanders.

These recognitions are awarded to individuals for their service to the community (often voluntary), their contribution in any field, or their faithful service to the Crown or the public sector.

"Our honours system is a way for New Zealand to say thanks and well done to those who have served and those who have achieved. We believe that such recognition is consistent with the egalitarian character of New Zealand society and enlivens and enriches it." — Report of the Prime Minister's Honours Advisory Committee, September 1995



History of the New Zealand Royal Honours system

- In 1848, Governor George Grey received the first honour granted to a New Zealand resident.
- From 1848 to 1975, New Zealand used the British honours system.
- In 1975, after a review of the system, two uniquely New Zealand honours were integrated into it: the Queen's Service Order, and the associated Queen's Service Medal.
- In 1987, the Order of New Zealand was instituted as the highest New Zealand honour. It recognises "outstanding service to the Crown and people of New Zealand in a civil or military capacity".
- In 1995, the system was comprehensively reviewed by a committee established by the then Prime Minister. The committee sought public submissions on the system, and reported back to the Prime Minister with a number of recommendations. A number of changes were made to the system as a result. The most significant was the establishment of the New Zealand Order of Merit in May 1996, which replaced New Zealand's use of the Order of the British Empire.
- As of 2021, only the dynastic British honours continue in active use in New Zealand, with the
 exception of the Order of the Companions of Honour.



The New Zealand Royal Honours system is made up of:

- The Order of New Zealand
- The New Zealand Order of Merit
- The Queen's Service Order and associated Queen's Service Medal
- The New Zealand Bravery and Gallantry Awards
- The New Zealand Distinguished Service Decoration
- The New Zealand Antarctic Medal.



Seniority of various New Zealand Honours





ONZ: The Order of New Zealand

The country's highest honour, restricted to 20 living persons at any time, plus additional members and honorary members.





Order of Merit* Breast star plus badge

Awarded for a pre-eminent contribution in any field over a sustained period. Services have usually rought international recognition.







Merit** Breast star plus



For pre-eminent contribution in any field achieving at a national or international level, recognised by peers and demonstrating sustained commitment.





CNZM: Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit

For a prominent national or international role, leading role in regional affairs or distinguished contribution to an area of activity.





QSO: Queen's Service Order

Recognises valuable voluntary service to the community or faithful service to the Crown or public sector. Usually awarded for service at a national level.





ONZM: Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit

For a distinguished regional or national role in any field,





MNZM: Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit

For achievement or service to the community, usually in a national role.





QSM: Queen's Service Meda

Same as QSO but usually awarded for service at a ocal or regional level.





How does the honours system work?

- Honours are administered by the Honours Unit, part of the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet.
- All nominations are considered by the Cabinet Appointments and Honours Committee, chaired by the Prime Minister. The formal responsibility for making recommendations to The Queen for the grant of honours rests with the Prime Minister.
- The final honours lists are approved by The Queen of New Zealand on the Prime Minister's advice.
- The Governor-General, on behalf of the Queen, holds investiture ceremonies for the people named in the New Year and The Queen's Birthday Honours Lists and in Special Honours Lists.



How do honours nominations work?

- Honours Lists are published at New Year and on Queen's Birthday. Special Lists are published periodically (eg. COV-19)
- Anyone can nominate a person they think is worthy of a New Zealand Royal Honour and anyone can be nominated.
- Nominations are made through a nomination form and letters of support.
- Nomination forms are accepted throughout the year, but the processing and consideration of nominations takes at least six months prior to the announcement of an honours list at Queen's Birthday or New Year.
- DPMC's Honours Unit assesses all nominations (including background checks), and provide advice to the APH Cabinet Committee on 'finalists'
- Nominations are general (eg. not for a specific honour), and the number of honours available is strictly limited for each list. Not everyone nominated can receive recognition.



Advise on outcome of suggested nominees (and potential reworking of the list)	By 29 April 2022	MO Services Team If applicable, C&P regional teams
Approval of final list of nominees by the Minister	By 29 April 2022	MO
Completion of Nomination forms and sourcing of Letter of support	By 25 May 2022	C&P regional teams
Peer review and submission of the Nomination forms and Letters of support to the MO	By 27 May 2022	Services team
Submission of Nominations to DPMC Honours Unit	By 15 June 2022	MO

- Submission of long list of potential nominees by 5 April.
- Finalise shortlisting decision-making process.
- Add MEC Honours process to induction pack for new C&P advisors.


