

I'm writing about disputes between long-time Rawhiti residents and a relatively new arrival, Julian Batchelor of 147 Rawhiti Road, Rawhiti.

The Cape Brett track from Rawhiti runs alongside Mr Batchelor's property and there appears to be some dispute over where his boundary ends and DoC's begins. This has resulted in instances in which Mr Batchelor has - according to walkers - asked for \$5 from people on the track because they are walking on "his" land.

The land I own is in 3 lots for which I pay roughly a year in rates.

THE CAPE BRETT WALKING TRACK

I own the first 200m of the Cape Brett walking track. The land I own overlooks Oke Bay, arguably the prettiest beach in the Bay of Islands.

This 200m of the track sits on an estate in fee simple being all that parcel of land containing 1, 1331 hectares more or less being Lot 6 Deposited Play 5\670 and comprised in Certificate of Title Identifier NA7C/1440. The rates on this particular piece of land are annum.

I also own another lot of land which Maori use to get to their Urupa. No permission has ever given by me for them to use it, yet they do. The simply see it as their right. An entitlement. This lot is an estate in fee simple being all that parcel of land containing 3834m2 more onless being Lot 3 Deposited Plan 51670 and comprised in Certificate of Title Identifier NA7C/1439. The rates on this land are

Now here's an interesting twist. There is currently no alternative start to the Cape Brett walking track, if walkers want to start at Oke Bay. That is to say, legally, I could close this part of the track if I wanted to. There is no public statute which declares that the public can walk over / use private freehold land at the expense of the landowner, without the owners permission. If fact, the opposite is true. The Trespass Act 1980 clearly states that entering / walking on another person's property without permission is trespass. And trespass is a criminal offence.

Maori and DOC share the fees which are collected from trampers who walk the track. Yet I receive nothing. Not even the rates. Conclusion? I own land which the government and Maori are collecting money from, yet I pay all the expenses related to this land. This is akin to the Kaikohe pub owner working the business 7 days a week, but being forced to give the profits to Maori and the government. How is this fair / just/ right? You know the answer, It's not.

First, I propose that at the very least DOC increase their Cape Brett walker fees by \$10 per person, giving me the \$10.

It is only fair that this payment is retrospective, given that this situation has existed since 2008, which is when I purchased the land. DOC has been fully aware of this situation since 2008, yet it's done nothing.

Secondly, I propose that DOC repay the per year for rates that I have been paying for 13 years, which equates to lost revenue.

This email is providing an update to you on where I am with respect to your email.

Thank you for the details with respect to the land that visitors use to start their Cape Brett journey. I understand that an alternative entry point is being looked at by other parties locally. I offer no comment with respect to entry to the urupa, we did confirm by survey that what had originally existed as marginal strip has over the course of the years eroded. You will need to have a conversation with the families who access this.

Yes, as you point out as the landowner you are indeed entitled to fence off the boundary to reduce the risk of unwanted visitors traversing your land. If you wouldn't mind confirming when/if you intend to do this so that I can arrange suitable signage and update our database, including the ones we have access to. I do note your suggestion to increase the fees as an alternative. I also acknowledge your frustration since 2008 about this, having no idea of any earlier conversations with either hapu or the Department.

There is a process that we have to undertake to adjust fees. In terms of your request for retrospective payment, I am seeking advice on this from our legal advisors. There is usually a 23 day turnaround time on this, a response to you is likely to be in January.



It would appear that from 'common knowledge' the agreement of the former owner to a right of passage over the property (folio 31 dated 1936) was physically put into effect with such a walkway maintained by the users for pedestrian purposes accessing the urupa. Our usual approach with people who may be breaching the banned from sale/propagation type rules is similar to what is used with the NPPA nursery enforcement following MPI guidance - they receive advice and warming first.

The relevant rule in our Regional Pest Management Plan is 6.4.1a being "Under Sections 52 and 53 of the Biosecurity Act 1993 no person can sell, propagate, breed, distribute or otherwise spread any pest in this Plan, or unwanted organism". This is not through the NPPA species list, but specific to the Northland region because we have added it to our plan.

Our plan would be to visit or call the potential offender to discuss and to make him aware of the rules, and follow that up with a Letter of Advice to ensure he is very clear on the rules. Depending on the outcome of the visit/phone call, we may then undertake a follow up visit. Site visits are a bit vicky to do at level 2 if he doesn't give us permission to enter (due to our own SOP rules). We would also want to determine where he has sourced his plants from - some in the photo look like mursery stock

Would be good to better understand any other issues at the site so we don't cause confusion or provide contradictory advice.

After karakia's they were carried up to the burial caves located at the end of the trail overlooking Te Araka. Te Araka is the name of the vines they used to pull the deceased warriors up the cliff and lay them out on the flat at Hauai Bay. The caves are there overgrown and tapu overlooking Te Araka also known as OKE Bay. The urupa was built along that same tribal pathway connecting the spiirits of those tupuna warriors. That is why the tribal walkway is so sensitive to Maori, It has history. That is why the esplanade reserve 8 and 9 is a precious to Maori particuarly Ngati Kuta. They are descendants of Hongi, Te Kemara, Whai Hakuene, Te Nana, Huri and Ururoa. Rewa, Moka, Whararahi who are Te Patukeha are nephewes of Hongi and also warriors of tank.
