

Household relates to a "private house-

The total weekly income of the household is the summing the values attributed to each category.

From 1 April 1978 a change in concept was made in the collection of income. A new questionnaire was introduced which collected details of the respondents income, occupation, industry, weekly hours worked and employment status.

For respondents who received a wage or salary, details of their last pay were requested and the amount was rated up to an annual equivalent. Respondents with business income were asked to state the net income, before tax, received from the business and the period to which it related. If the period was less than 12 months it was also rated up to an annual equivalent. Details are also collected on benefits or pensions received, as well as interest, dividends, rent, trust income, maintenance and any irregular and/or lump sum income.

Although all the additional details are collected only that information which is necessary to ensure the current Household Survey EDP system can function is used.

5. Expenditure

In accordance with the recommendations of the 1971 Consumers Price Index Revision Advisory Committee, the Household Survey collection has been based on the recording of expenditure, or expenditure commitment, on goods and services acquired by a household in a particular reference period, whether or not these acquisitions are consumed during that period.

In this volume, average expenditure is portrayed under eight main headings:

Food — purchases, including meals away from home where recorded by respondents.

Housing — rent, mortgage repayments, repairs and maintenance, and net capital costs of house sales and purchases.

Household Operation — fuel, light, and power; household equipment and appliances; furniture, domestic supplies and services.

Apparel — clothing and footwear.

Transportation — public transport, overseas travel costs, net cost of vehicle sales and purchases; repairs and maintenance; vehicle insurance, registration, etc.

Tobacco and Alcohol — purchases.

Other Supplies — medical, health, and personal goods; recreational, educational, and cultural goods.

Other Services — medical and health services; entertainment charges; education fees; accommodation charges; personal services; licence fees; life insurance premiums.

In each group the expenditure comprises the total cost of particular goods or services, including credit costs, hire and repair charges.

From 1 April 1979 the collection of information on goods sold or traded-in by households was introduced. Households were asked to identify the goods they sold for which they received more than \$20 each. The value of the goods sold was then coded as negative to the purchases and therefore deducted, along with the trade-ins, from the gross purchases, giving a net cost. The groups affected are: Household Operation (with Electrical and Non-Electrical Appliances, Furniture, Home Maintenance Equipment and Materials, Leisure and Recreational Equipment, Floor Coverings and Household Textiles) Apparel (Clothing and Footwear) and Other Goods (Miscellaneous Sales and/or Trade-Ins).

All expenditures are expressed as average weekly expenditure per household in the particular category. Households are categorised according to their total income, number of occupants, the family types of the members and the age of the head of household.

In all cases, information as reported or recorded by the household is given without adjustment. Overseas experience has shown that expenditure on tobacco and alcohol, meals away from home, and food items such as ice-cream and confectionery tend to be understated in household surveys. There is reason to believe that this Household Survey collection contains similar features.

It should be noted that for all tables in this report, the aggregate survey expenditure data for an item have been averaged over all households in a group, not over only those households in the group reporting expenditure on the item.

6. Occupation

Primary information relating to occupations is condensed and allocated to specified occupational groups as defined in the appropriate tables. This grouping conforms with that used in other Department of Statistics publications. In the event of an individual having an alternative source of income the employment from which he derives the greater sum is regarded as the main occupation.

7. Geographical Stratification

Published results of the survey are available only on a national basis.

For many statistical collections New Zealand is divided into 24 urban areas⁽³⁾. For the purposes of designing the sample frame for the Household Survey these are grouped in the following way into five major strata.

1. Auckland, viz. North Auckland, West Auckland, Central Auckland and South Auckland.
2. Wellington, viz. Upper Hutt, Lower Hutt, Porirua and Wellington.
3. Christchurch.
4. Other main urban areas viz. Whangarei, Hamilton, Tauranga, Rotorua, Gisborne, Napier, Hastings, New Plymouth, Wanganui, Palmerston North, Masterton, Nelson, Timaru, Dunedin and Invercargill.
5. The remainder of the North and South Islands.

8. Census Meshblocks

These are the smallest statistical areas used in the Census of Population and Dwellings.

⁽³⁾ In addition to the central city or borough, urban areas include neighbouring boroughs, town districts and parts of counties which are regarded as suburban or as belonging to that centre of population, irrespective of their being under different local administration.

NOTES TO TABLES

1. Tables 1-7 express average weekly household expenditure under the following expenditure groupings.

Food	Apparel
Housing	Transportation
Household Operation	Tobacco and Alcohol
Other Supplies	Other Services

In some cases these groups are combined or broken down further into various sub-groups.

2. Table 8 illustrates the number of households in defined weekly income groups by given characteristics. Some households, especially in the lower income groups, show average expenditures, exceeding average incomes. This is accounted for mainly by particular households having had excessive outgoings on major commitments at the time they were surveyed, either from accumulated savings or from hire purchase etc. At the other end of the scale are households with high incomes reporting low average expenditures. This also could be a short-term effect brought about by unusual circumstances prevailing at the time.
3. Table 9 relates the total weekly income of the household to various characteristics of the head of the household. A comparison of three categories, taken together with the total weekly income of the household, emphasises that the nomination of head of household status to one person by other household members is based mainly on two concepts — deference to age, and financial status.
4. Tables 10 and 11 categorise occupants of households both by age and earning capacity. Apart from relationships referred to in the previous table which also pertain here, attention is directed to the differences in numbers of persons 'Actively engaged' and 'Persons receiving \$20 or more per week'. The latter includes persons receiving social security benefits, superannuation incomes, war pensions, etc. This is well illustrated in the column for head of household aged 65 years and over where the numbers of persons actively engaged are 122, persons receiving \$20 or more per week are 1,073 and persons 65 years and over number 884. In this instance the majority of incomes obviously include the receipts of incomes other than salary or wages. Averages for the numbers of persons per household have been rounded to two decimal places.

COMPARISON BETWEEN 1976-77 AND 1979-80 RESULTS

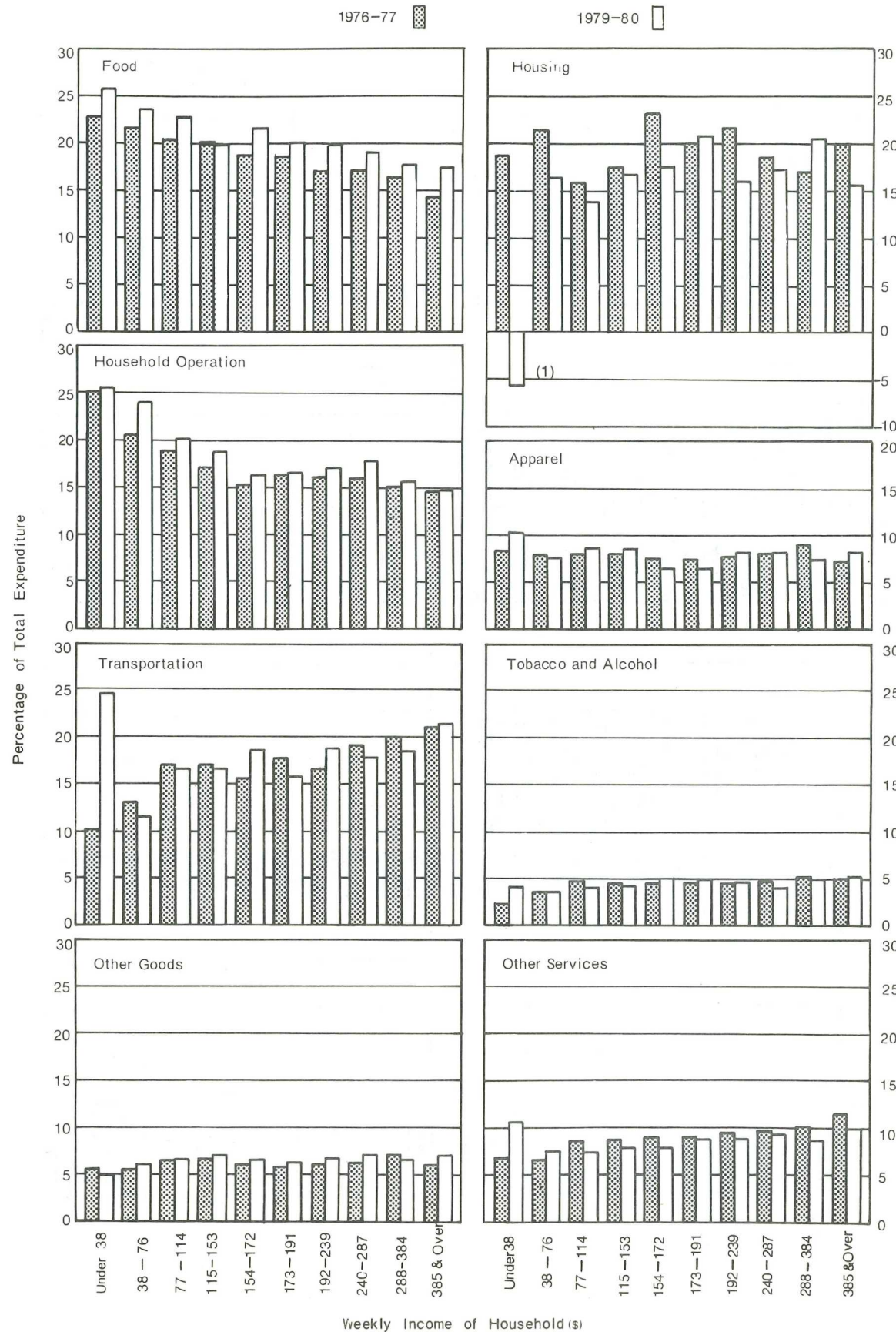
