# Request for Official Information: Information on Ruapehu Alpine Lifts Administration

Thank you for your correspondence of 2 May 2024 requesting information under the Official Information Act 1982 (OIA). Following our request for clarification and refinement of the request under s 15(1AA) of the OIA, on 22 May you confirmed your refined request under the OIA to be for the following information, for the period of 1 August 2023 – 22 May 2024:

- Formal advice provided by Te Arawhiti to Ministers since 1 August 2023 relating to Ruapehu Alpine Lifts and all related matters.
- 2. Te Arawhiti comment on ministerial advice prepared by the Department of Conservation and the Ministry for Business Innovation and Employment since 1 August 2023 relating to Ruapehu Alpine Lifts and all related matters.

#### Response

We have considered your request under the OIA and have identified 26 documents either partially or entirely within scope of your request. This letter attaches the first set of documents within scope of your request, as in **Table 1**.

Under section 15A of the OIA, we are undertaking consultation necessary to make a decision on the remainder of your request. We will provide our decision on the remaining documents, listed in **Table 2**, no later than 4 July.

Where we have withheld documents in whole or information in part, the ground(s) on which we have relied are set out in the table. We have considered, under section 9(1) of the OIA whether the withholding of these documents or this information is outweighed by other considerations which render it desirable, in the public interest, to make that information available.

Te Arawhiti acknowledges that there is public interest in understanding the complex environment and interests relating to the status of RAL. The information released

acknowledges that public interest. The information we have withheld primarily relates to confidential and frank engagement between the Crown and iwi with interests in and around Tongariro National Park. We have also withheld draft documents to maintain a forum for officials to informally discuss and provide free and frank feedback on draft advice to Ministers. However, we have provided a high-level overview of Te Arawhiti comments made as part of the drafting process in **Table 3**.

When Te Arawhiti acknowledged receipt of your OIA request, we advised we may proactively release your OIA response on our website. 
## Reconciliation package for Patutokotoko

- Further to engagement with Patutokotoko on Ruapehu Alpine Lifts (RAL) issues, including their concerns around the trademark over their "Tūroa" family name, we agreed in June to explore the development of an outside-of-settlement reconciliation package.
- 2. Subject to relevant agency and Ministerial approvals, the package is likely to consist of:
  - Crown support for historical research into the history of Patutokotoko and the Tūroa family;
  - development of multimedia materials and construction of a marae to tell the Patutokotoko story;
  - funding to enable the purchase of land for the construction of a marae or other cultural hub; and
  - assistance resolving concerns around commercial use of the Tūroa family name.
- We are preparing advice to go to the Minister for Treaty of Waitangi Negotiations in the week of 4 September. We will seek his signature on a letter to Patutokotoko committing to continued Crown engagement.

# Ruapehu Alpine Lifts Ltd (In liquidation) - Ngāti Tūwharetoa

## **Purpose**

- 1. The purpose of this briefing is to provide you with:
  - a summary of the concerns Ngāti Tūwharetoa have raised in relation to the process to find a commercial operator for the Mt Ruapehu ski fields, and relevant background information; and
  - b. provide Te Arawhiti advice, as requested by the Minister for Regional Development, on decisions Ministers may make in relation to a commercial operator, in the context of the concerns raised by Ngāti Tūwharetoa.

#### **Background**

- 2. In June, Te Arawhiti supported MBIE and the Department of Conservation (DoC) at a number of targeted engagement hui with iwi and hapū with interests in Mt Ruapehu, following a breakdown in Māori-Crown relationships over the Mt Ruapehu ski fields.
- 3. The purpose of the engagement programme was to hear and understand iwi and hapū perspectives on the government's plan to select an operator(s) for the Mt Ruapehu ski fields, when Ruapehu Alpine Lifts went into liquidation.

5. On 8 June, DoC received an email from Te Ariki Tā Tumu Te Heuheu, in which he outlined his overarching frustration with the processes surrounding RAL in voluntary administration and the lack of attention the Crown had paid to the integral relationship between Ngāti Tūwharetoa and their tupuna maunga.




- 23. No applications for new ski field concessions have been lodged at this point in time, however, the Minister of Conservation or her delegate are obliged to consider any that are received.
- 24. In making a decision to grant or decline the application, the decision-maker must give consideration to the views of all relevant iwi to give effect the principles of the Treaty of Waitangi as per Section 4 of the Conservation Act 1987.
- 25. It is important to note, no iwi has right of veto over the application in this process for which the Crown is the decision-maker.

#### Te Arawhiti view

- 32. Ngāti Tūwharetoa have outlined their concerns with the commercial process the Crown has run in relation to the future of ski field operations on Mt Ruapehu a number of times. These concerns have now been raised in emails, in meetings and in letters to Ministers and in part relate to commitments made through the 2018 Deed of Settlement between the Crown and Ngāti Tūwharetoa.
- 33. The profound significance of the maunga is formally acknowledged by the Crown in the 2018 Settlement and is the Crown's commitment to entering into negotiations over the Tongariro National Park. Specifically, the Crown has acknowledged that when the peaks of the maunga were offered to the Crown, Ngāti Tūwharetoa sought to create a shared responsibility with the Crown to protect and preserve the mountains for Ngāti Tūwharetoa, for other iwi, and for all New Zealanders.
- 34. In offering the peeks of the maunga to the Crown, the intention of Ngāti Tūwharetoa was to enter into a partnership with the Queen, and not to make an unconditional gift however legal ownership of the mountains was vested solely in the Crown and it has not always honoured its reciprocal obligations.

An enduring relationship between Ngāti Tūwharetoa and the Crown


- In the interests of an enduring relationship between Ngāti Tūwharetoa and the Crown, it is important that a final decision in relation to commercial operations on Mt Ruapehu is based on a way forward that:
  - is a good faith attempt to address the concerns Ngāti Tūwharetoa has raised; a.
  - does not compromise the commitments made by the Crown in the 2018 Deed of b. Settlement;

- d. Allows for a positive, enduring relationship between Ngāti Tūwharetoa and the Crown.
- 43. It is also important to note that the Crown has also made commitments to other iwi (including through their Deeds of Settlement) to grow and maintain enduring relationships based on mutual trust and respect. These also need to be acknowledged and recognised through the decision making process.

#### **Next steps**

46. We will continue to support MBIE and DoC to engage with Ngāti Tūwharetoa and other iwi through this process, and ensure the position of iwi and hapū is reflected in any relevant advice to Ministers.

#### Tongariro National Park - Ruapehu Alpine Lifts

- 27. Ruapehu Alpine Lifts, currently in receivership, operates the two ski-fields within Tongariro National Park Whakapapa and Tūroa. To enable the 2024 ski-season to proceed, new operators and concessions will need to be in place by June 2024 at the latest. Concessions are a statutory permission that enable certain types of activities on public conservation land; in the case of RAL, companies that are proposing to take over the existing ski-field operations require a concession issued by the Minister of Conservation (or delegate) to operate within Tongariro National Park.
- 28. Throughout 2023 Te Arawhiti has played a supporting role to facilitate and support Crown engagement with the multiple iwi and hapū with interests in Tongariro National Park. The Ministry for Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE) leads the commercial aspects to Ruapehu Alpine Lifts (RAL) and the Department of Conservation (DOC) leads the concessions process. Both agencies intend to brief their respective Ministers before Christmas on the decisions required to enable the 2024 ski-field season to proceed. Those briefings will recommend a joint Ministerial hui before Christmas (including you given the future negotiations over Tongariro National Park). We will work with MBIE and DOC to prepare a joint briefing to support that engagement.
- 29. DOC expect to begin consultation before the end of the year on skifield concessions for Tūroa skifield to enable a concession to be granted in April 2024. DOC has advised iwi with interests in Tongariro National Park of expected time frames.

30. It is likely the concession process will result in media attention relating to the skifields and/or the Tongariro National Park collective negotiations. In the week beginning 11 December we will provide a media pack for your office.

16. The Cabinet paper Ruapehu Alpine Lifts: Decisions to continue support for RAL post-March 2024 will now be considered by the Cabinet Economic Policy Committee on 6 March and Cabinet on 11 March. The paper seeks Cabinet decisions on the future of the two ski-fields (Whakapapa and Tūroa). - 18. We understand that MBIE are intending to engage with iwi prior to Cabinet consideration to inform them of the forthcoming process and providing a commitment to engage once Cabinet has given a direction on the future of the ski-fields.

#### Patutokotoko – reconciliation agreement

In 2023, the Crown, led by officials from the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment, engaged with iwi with interests in the TNP on the liquidation processes of Ruapehu Alpine Lifts (RAL). Poor or late engagement in relation to RAL harmed relationships between the Crown and iwi, including Ngāti Tūwharetoa.



We understand that the Ministry for Business Innovation and Employment contacted all groups with interests in the national park prior to the public announcement. There has been little commentary in the media from iwi (except from the chair of Te Korowai o Wainuiārua who has outlined that there was "no consultation with iwi/Māori"). We are working with MBIE and DOC regarding next steps for Whakapapa ski-field, including iwi engagement.



#### Tongariro National Park - Ruapehu Alpine Lifts

7. During discussions with iwi in 2023 regarding Ruapehu Alpine Lifts, the then Minister for Treaty of Waitangi Negotiations agreed to explore a reconciliation package with the hapū of Patutokotoko. On 2 April we met with the hapū of Patutokotoko regarding the exploration of a reconciliation package. We will report to you on the outcomes of the exploration process in late April and provide options on how to proceed for your consideration.

8. Patutokotoko have consistently raised concerns about the commercial use of the family name 'Turoa' in relation to Pure Turoa Limited's purchase of Turoa ski-field and the associated concession to operate within Tongariro National Park. We understand the Minister of Conservation is due to decide on the Turoa ski-field concession by 5 April.





#### Ruapehu Alpine Lifts – iwi engagement

- 25. On 10 May 2024, we joined senior officials from DOC to meet with Ngā Tangata Tiaki (the Whanganui River post-settlement governance entity) and representatives of Ngāti Hāua, the hapū of Patutokotoko, Ngāti Rangi and Te Korowai o Wainuiārua. The purpose of the hui was to discuss iwi concerns about the Tūroa ski area concession process in March. DOC officials conceded that, in June last year, the Crown committed to engage differently with iwi with interests in Tongariro National Park in relation to the processes around Ruapehu Alpine Lifts, but this had not occurred.
