I will answer your OIA request (Request #16/889/3 (COLLINS, Zane) in two parts:

Part 1

'What is the training you provide for policemen so that they are able to assess Domestic Violence'.

Family Violence training Police Recruits currently receive is:

Under the new Career Foundation Initial Training Programme (CFIT), Family Violence Training starts before recruits even arrive at the College with foundation learning provided by UNITEC. Within the UNITEC 12 week programme there is a Family Violence component which is made up of informative awareness material and a research component.

When recruits arrive at the College they are introduced to Te Puna (Police online Learning Centre) and the CFIT Course material via Learner Pages. Family Violence Training then follows:

Induction Phase - creating mindset:

- 2. IN01 FV Initial Action FV, Response and attendance and appreciation process, 2hrs
- 3. FV01 Victim Advocate Victims Manager, 2 hrs
- 4. FV02 What is Family Violence? Examines the World of FV and what it is like to live in that world, 4 hr workshop
- 5. FV03 Victim Support The services they provide to victims of FV, 1 hr
- 6. FV04 The FV Perpetrator A Perpetrators Perspective, 3 hrs
- FV05 Working with FV Victims and Perpetrators. Exposure to FV Episodes and problem solving, 3 hr workshop

- 8. FV06 Quality Data Collection FV Form set + FVIR Formative Written Assessment, 4 hrs
- 9. FV07 Intro to IPV and ODARA, 2 hrs
- 10. FV08 Intro to Child Risk Factors and Reports of Concern, 1hr
- 11. Summative Two Practical Assessment. Witness Statement. Taking a statement from a witness to a FV incident, 4 hrs

Part 2

As per the <u>DV act</u> that any police officer can arrest a man, if they have a "good cause".

Domestic Violence Act 1995 - Section 50

Power to arrest for breach of protection order

Where a protection order is in force, any constable may arrest, without warrant, any person who the constable has good cause to suspect has—

(a)contravened the protection order; or

(b)failed to comply with any condition of the protection order. **NOTE: DVA power of arrest is covered in FV09**

As outlined, Police officers are very well trained to be able to 'assess Domestic Violence' and conduct thorough Family Harm investigations.
