Dear Ms Rākete

Thank you for your email dated 31 July 2016, requesting information about the number of prisoners participating in Tikanga Māori programmes in New Zealand prisons. Your request has been considered under the Official Information Act 1982 (OIA).

The Tikanga Programme's main purpose is to increase participants' motivation to take part in further rehabilitation programmes, education, training and/or employment after completing the programme. The programme is run as both a community and prison based programme.

Further to this objective, Tikanga Programmes aim to:

- Increase participant knowledge across the four kaupapa taught in the programme (manaakitanga, whanaungatanga, rangatiratanga, and wairuatanga) and their understanding of their cultural identity;
- Increase participant motivation to improve their pro-social supports;
- Increase participant motivation to address factors that contributed toward their offending.

Tikanga Programmes motivate offenders to change their behaviour by helping them to understand their cultural identity, and encouraging and challenging them to understand and embody the kaupapa and tikanga of their tîpuna (ancestors). All Department Tikanga Programmes follow the Te Ihu Waka Framework, which mean that they are structured around the following four kaupapa:

- Manaakitanga is the principle of reciprocal care and goodwill that will never run dry. From manaakitanga, participants learn about the expression of aroha, hospitality, generosity, mutual respect and become motivated to act in a manner that uplifts and enhances the mana of those around them.
- Whanaungatanga is the principle of kinship obligations and responsibility to whanau. Within this kaupapa, participants are taught how to develop positive relationships with whânau.
- Rangatiratanga states that a person's status and mana is dictated in part by their humility and willingness to support others. Rangatiratanga

- encourages self-ownership and can help motivate participants to take responsibility for their offending behaviour.
- Wairuatanga is the principle of cultural and spiritual integration. Wairuatanga brings about a sense of inner peace and connectedness for participants with their whânau and the environment.

Programmes are designed and delivered by local providers to cater to a variety of learning styles, and teach these four kaupapa through a mix of discussion, role play, the practice of marae protocol, kapahaka and a range of teamwork and individual exercises.

You have asked for the number of prisoners participating in Tikanga Māori programmes in New Zealand prisons since the programme began. Please note the Department only holds Tikanga Maori programme records since 2012/13. This information is provided to you as Appendix One.

I trust the information provided is of assistance. Should you have any concerns with this response, I would encourage you to raise these with the Department.
