Thank you for your email of 14 May 2017 requesting, under the Official Information Act 1982, the following information:

"I wish to know what proportion of immigrants over the last 12 months are coming via the immigration skills shortage lists with breakdown of these across region of departure (ie Asia, UK, etc). Of those on the skills shortage list and regions how many are coming through on each visa category as described on https://www.newzealandnow.govt.nz/move-to-nz/new-zealand-visa/compare-nz-visa-types"

Immigration New Zealand (INZ) does not hold "region of departure" in a reportable format.

Applicants depart from many countries in the world, and travel via different routes, to arrive in New Zealand, while others will have already been in New Zealand when they applied for their work visa.

Please note that of the visa categories you referred to from the NewZealandNow website, only work visas are subject to skills shortage lists. The information below is for work visas where a labour market check was required.
