Part 1: Current priority outcome areas

Women's skills, employment, and income

Funding for 'He Poutama Rangatahi/Youth Employment Pathways' (Budget Sensitive)

We have been consulted by MBIE officials on a paper led by the Minister of Employment and the Minister of Regional Economic Development, seeking Cabinet agreement to the appropriation of funding (up to \$5 million by March 2017 and \$10 million by the end of 2018) to support implementation of the He Poutama Rangatahi/Youth Employment Pathways initiative.

This initiative will supporti communities to match rangatahi (young people) who are at risk of long term unemployment with existing and future job opportunities in Northland/Taitokerau, the Eastern Bay of Plenty, Te Tairawahiti/East Coast and Hawkes Bay. Most of these rangatahi are Māori, and many of them are women with caregiving responsibilities. Our work interviewing mothers in Whangarei and South Auckland, and Te Puni Kōkiri's research, confirms that young mothers in these circumstances are highly motivated to get trained and find good work to support themselves and their children. The Minister of Employment has identified that he will work with you as Minister for Women on this strategy.

We recommend you support this paper.

Meeting with Tertiary Education Commission (TEC) officials

We met with TEC to discuss our respective work programmes, reporting and monitoring mechanisms for the Māori and Pacific Trades Training programme, and how we can work together in 2018. We advised that our ongoing focus has been to encourage TEC and Ministry of Education officials to clearly identify the very positive 'returns on investment' made for these Māori and Pasifika learners and the explicit requirement to report outcomes for women learners.


Closing the Public Service Gender Pay Gap

Women's safety from violence

Next steps following the launch of the digital harm research

The launch of the digital harm research received good coverage in the media, and good feedback from our stakeholders working in this area. This coverage is increasing visibility for digital harm as an issue, and encouraging discussion on solutions.

On Wednesday, 6 December 2017 Netsafe launched its report 'Teens and "sexting" in New Zealand: Prevalence and attitudes. The "sexting" report is part of our ongoing partnership with Netsafe exploring young people's experiences of digital risk and harm. We expect further reports to be released by Netsafe on related issues in 2018.

Youth Court meeting on female offenders

We attended a cross-agency meeting with Youth Court judges about young female and gender diverse offenders. The meeting was organised by the Principal Youth Court Judge, Judge Walker, in response to growing concern amongst the Youth Court judges about young female offenders. The discussion centred on the backgrounds of family violence, sexual abuse and care and protection orders of many of the offenders. Each social sector agency was asked what their agency is doing about young female offenders; we advised that we are currently scoping research in this area. We can provide you with information on other agencies' approaches, should you wish. The group will meet again in six months.

Nominations service update

We provided nominations to the Health Research Council and Children's Autism Foundation.

We met with Auckland Council staff to discuss opportunities to enhance the quality of their candidate database with the potential to make links to our own nominations database.

We attended the Institute of Directors' Bold Steps conference to promote the nominations service and connect with women interested in leadership and governance roles. Keynote speakers included leader and professional director Joan Withers, Spark Digital CEO Jolie Hodson and Tech Futures Lab founder Frances Valintine.

Other matters

New Zealand Institute of Economic Research (NZIER) Policy Benchmarking Awards

On Tuesday 5 December we attended NZIER's annual awards for public sector policy advice. Agencies provide NZIER with a representative sample of Ministerial briefings and receive guidance on what is working well and what areas there are for improvement. This year we were ranked as second runner-up (behind Ministry of Justice and Ministry of Defence). We have climbed 10 places in the rankings compared to 2016's result.

Legislating to Drive Action to Reduce Child Poverty (Budget Sensitive)

We were consulted by the Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet on the Prime Minister's Cabinet paper to introduce legislation that will require all Governments to:

- set and publish longer-term (ten years) and intermediate targets and measures of child poverty,
- · report each year on progress towards the targets and,
- publish strategies to improve children's wellbeing.

The proposed legislative framework will help ensure ongoing Governments are transparent and held to account in reducing child poverty. This paper was approved by Cabinet Business Committee on 6 December.

We advised that sole parent families (of which 85 percent are mother-led) have higher rates of child poverty and persistent material hardship. Māori and Pasifika populations are disproportionately represented among these families. Collection of administrative data that enables breakdown by age, gender, ethnicity, family indicators and hours worked is critical to the development of strategies and approaches to reduce poverty. We recommend that you send a note of support to the Prime Minister for tabling this paper. We can provide a draft letter, should you require it.
