I left a phone message yesterday; this is just a follow-up message. I'm beginning work on a review of the methamphetamine contamination situation in the NZ housing stock (both Housing NZ and private), interpreting the new standards, and explaining health risks. The review has been requested of our office by the Minister of Housing, Hon Phil Twyford. I will be gathering data from Housing NZ as well as the National Drug Intelligence Bureau, and will be speaking with various stakeholders to get their views and input.

I have already spoken at length with Dr Nick Kim and have received some documents from him. I asked him for recommendations of others to speak to and he specifically mentioned your name as someone who has done a lot of testing and would have a good perspective on the situation from the ESR viewpoint.

Hi Daniel,

Hamish Rogers from the National Risks Unit (DPMC) has given me your email as the best contact for the National Drug Intelligence Bureau.

I work with Sir Peter Gluckman, the PM's Chief Science Advisor. We have recently been asked by Minister Twyford to produce a report on the risks associated with residual methamphetamine contamination in houses/apartments, including a review of the new standards and the current testing and remediation situation.

As part of this, we would like to get some information/statistics from NDIB - mainly stats and trends around clandestine lab discovery, and whether there are standard triggers for testing for methamphetamine in situations where it is not obvious that a clan lab has operated, but where meth may have been used.

Would you be able to help with this, or point me to someone who can?
