Poutama Tuatahi Rangahau Level One Researching or discovering phase

Te reo Māori

- Commits to correct pronunciation of kupu Māori
- Understands and can say everyday words in te reo Māori
- Can use basic sentences correctly in te reo Māori
- Use greetings when talking to or responding to people on the phone and through emails
- Uses basic conversational phrases
- · Able to deliver a simple mihi/pepeha
- Uses the te reo Māori translation services policy when required

Karakia/waiata

- · Participates in the karakia/waiata sessions
- · Distinguishes four karakia that apply to:
- morning karakia (Whakataka te hau)
- opening hui (Timatanga)
- closing hui (Whakamutunga)
- sharing and eating food (Whakawatea kai)

Kawa and tikanga

- · Leading or leading with others, mihi whakatau
- Can respond to mihi when in the manuhiri role
- Adopts and implements kawa and tikanga internally and externally when representing Manatū Hauora

Poutama Tuarua - Whakamōhio Level Two

Self-learning

- Te reo Māori
- Uses and adds to basic phrases learnt in level one
- · Can pronounce kupu Māori correctly
- Uses health-related words in te reo Māori
- Can string together two or more sentences correctly in te reo Māori
- Understands and uses kīwaha (idioms)
- Uses te reo Māori in written communication eg, media releases or letters or content on the Ministry of Health website

Karakia/waiata

- Learns the meaning and be able to recite four karakia
- Learns Manatū Hauora waiata, ie, Manatū Hauora Pātere, Ko Te Reo, Tēnei Au and Te Konohete waiata
- Participates in Te Kōnohete (public sector kapa haka concert) as a supporter or performer

Kawa and tikanga

- Recognises the uniqueness of mihi whakatau as per local iwi tikanga and Manatū Hauora participation
- Can deliver an extended mihi which includes whakapapa/pepeha
- · Visits marae

- Visits Māori health providers
- Understands the importance of tikanga and kawa in engagement with iwi and health providers

History of mana whenua

 Identifies places of significance to mana whenua and local iwi with site visits and within walking distance of the Ministry

Te reo Māori

- Can express sympathy and congratulations in te reo Māori
- Can express a basic opinion on an issue in te reo Māori
- Can express support on an issue in te reo
 Māori
- Can string together multiple sentences fluently in te reo Māori in formal and informal situations
- Uses te reo Māori in written communication, eg, brochures, pamphlets, surveys
- Uses te reo Māori in consultation and engagement with Māori, policies, strategies and other published material

Karakia/waiata

- · Leads and recites four karakia
- Demonstrates understanding of when to use the correct karakia at the appropriate time and occasion
- Leads and recites Manatū Hauora waiata and actions
- Actively participates in significant events, ie, ANZAC, Matariki, Te Wiki o Te Reo with appropriate waiata and history

Te reo Māori

- · Can demonstrate a fluency in te reo Māori
- Can use informal Māori language appropriately in oral communications
- Can use informal Māori language appropriately in written communications
- · Has a large vocabulary in te reo Māori
- Can express themselves clearly in te reo Māori including historical accounts and whakataukī (proverbs)

Karakia/waiata

Can demonstrate appropriate and active participation in karakia/waiata and specifically:

- · can lead four or more karakia/waiata
- can articulate the meaning and intention of karakia/waiata
- composes karakia/waiata for Manatū Hauora

Kawa and tikanga

- Can lead consultation or engagement with Māori
- Can lead whaikorero at mihi whakatau or pohiri
