POLICE AND AUCKLAND PRIDE MOVING FORWARD TOGETHER



Last week, New Zealand Police was advised by the Board of Auckland Pride that a decision had been made that Police officers were welcome to participate in the 2019 Auckland Pride Parade, but would not be able to march in uniform.

The Board came to this decision following its annual series of consultation meetings, during which members of our rainbow communities had come forward with feedback about the presence of Police. The visibility of the Police uniform, in particular, had made them feel less safe about participating in the Auckland Pride Parade.

Issues and concerns relating to New Zealand Police were raised again and again throughout a series of four Auckland Pride Community Hui that were held across Tāmaki Makaurau during August. Complaints about Police consistently outnumbered feedback about any other institution or organisation.

A special Hot Topic Hui was organised for October, so the Board could hear more views from our communities on the place of New Zealand Police within Auckland Pride.

The personal experiences of Police mistreatment shared by LGBTQIA+ people throughout this lengthy consultation process were deeply affecting. The Board could not ignore them.

The Board's decision to ask Police to march in the 2019 Auckland Pride Parade, out of uniform, was a compromise. The intention was to encourage all people within our rainbow communities to feel safe and included within their own event – without having to exclude our valued LGBTQIA+ Police officers.

New Zealand Police subsequently decided to exclude its own people, because they could not wear a uniform that was causing LGBTQIA+ people and communities to feel unwelcome at an LGBTQIA+ event. Auckland Pride values people over uniforms.

Auckland Pride's major public event, the Parade along Ponsonby Road is first and foremost a celebration of and for Tāmaki Makaurau's rainbow communities – which includes people identifying as gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, intersex, takatāpui, whakawāhine, tangata ira tāne, fa'afafine, fakaleiti, akava'ine, māhū, vaka sa lewa lewa, rae rae, fiafifine, fakafifine, palopa, kathoey, hijra, baklâ, genderfluid, genderqueer, pansexual, asexual, queer and questioning.

Following the Board's decision, and subsequent Police decision, both organisations have been engaged in ongoing dialogue, and have expressed a commitment to work alongside each other in order to build safer communities together.

Police staff, including Diversity Liaison Officers (DLO's), will still be engaging with the 2019 Parade in an operational capacity. For a list of rainbow-friendly DLO contacts, please visit: www.police.govt.nz/dlos

Auckland Pride has offered to facilitate opportunities for non-uniformed Police officers to march in the 2019 Parade with local rainbow community groups and other participating organisations.

Auckland Pride will continue to work with New Zealand Police towards an equitable partnership and long-term plan in which both organisations can move forward together to explore solutions to the issues and concerns that have been raised, and to support healing and reconciliation.

The Board of Auckland Pride wishes to acknowledge New Zealand Police for their willingness to work alongside rainbow communities towards upholding the rights and dignity of all people of diverse sexual orientation, gender identities, gender expressions and sex characteristics living in Aotearoa New Zealand.

The Board apologises to our rainbow communities for any distress that may have been caused by this decision, and our lack of communication over the past week. The Board had agreed to work on a joint statement with Police, and remained silent out of respect for this process.

Thank you to all those who engaged in the intervening debate in a thoughtful and respectful manner. Auckland Pride's objective is to create safe spaces for our communities and to discuss the issues that are important to them.

The Board invites people who wish to talk about the Police decision to attend a special Auckland Pride Community Hui, facilitated by Tim Foote, at the Grey Lynn Community Centre this Sunday 18 November, commencing at 7.30pm.

Police and Auckland Pride Joint Press Release Wednesday 14th November 2017

New Zealand Police were advised by the Pride Board last week that a decision had been made that Police officers were allowed to take part in the Auckland Pride Parade in 2019 – but were unable to march in uniform.

Police acknowledge their views and we support the Pride Parade in creating a safe space for all to attend.

New Zealand Police was disappointed by this decision however and we have subsequently withdrawn our application to march in the Pride Parade next year.

Police are committed to supporting and working with our Rainbow community and we are proud of the work we currently do to celebrate diversity and support our Rainbow community. However we also acknowledge that there are also areas where we can improve in this space.

Police have been in discussions with the Pride Board since this decision was made and we are committed to working alongside each other in order to build safer communities together.

I don't feel that the press release just sent through this is accurate or balanced it still appears to be speaking on our behalf which is not appropriate. I have asked this sentence above in red is removed.

James was at all the hui and there were not as portrayed a whole lot of stories. Kyras' story was very sad and I am yet to have the other side reviewed as they have decline my requests to share the story, take a complaint and investigate.

As discussed time is moving on and people need to know the outcome so Pride should go ahead and release – we tried for a joint one and at this point we agree that it isn't working and not in a timely way.

Police remain committed to working with the Board and Rainbow Communities (all of them) to address the issues. We request a meeting early December 2018 with the Board and especially including Tahi and Phylesia so we can plan how the board can be an effective conduit for the minorities to have their voices heard and find the solutions we all want.

Happy to find a date and venue that suits the board but let's lock it in and make a difference. Let me know what suits and we will work around you.

We are also keen to hear or receive a plan on the apology aspect – what the board thinks that could look like and how we work together to address the issues of the past and move forward.

I do remind the board that my day job is dealing with complaints against police and I am happy to talk through our processes and receive complaints for addressing formally. If people don't feel safe to come to Police there is always the Independent Police Conduct Authority website as well.

The behaviour we walk past is the behaviour we accept and we do hold our people to account to effect behaviour change. For that we need specifics.

The *Auckland Pride Festival Inc* is an Incorporated Society, meaning that we are a member-driven organisation that abides by an agreed-upon set of rules.

RULES ABOUT BOARD ELECTIONS & NOMINATIONS FOR THE UPCOMING AGM

In our rules it is stated that we are to have a Board of nine people. Of these nine Board members, **four are elected positions** – elected at our Annual General Meeting (AGM) – and **five are appointed** later by the Board.

Each Board member's term (how long they stay on the Board without being re-elected or appointed) is set at two years. However, after two years an individual can re-stand for re-election or be appointed.

As the rules were amended in 2017, and this is the first AGM since the adoption of this rule, there is a one-off rule that two elected and two appointed Board members must stand down this year.

Due to this year's one-off rule, Verity George and Cassie Roma (current Chair) will need to stand down and seek re-election if they so desire.

Sonya Temata and Zakk d'Larté have completed their two-year terms and must stand down as well. They can choose to seek re-election if they wish.

It is important to note that only Matt Jackson and Michael Lett remain on the Board as they were appointed for a two-year term in 2017 and are not due to stand down until 2019.

Applications for appointment to the Board will open after the AGM.

WHAT TO EXPECT AT THE UPCOMING AGM

At an AGM you can expect:

- Reports from the Chair, Treasurer and Staff
- Potential for remits (motions to the AGM any member can put forward a motion, these are normally around constitutional changes)
- Elections of officers (as a member you will sign in at the door and receive a voting ballot on the night.)

The AGM is on Monday 30 July at Studio One Toi Tu in Ponsonby starting at 6pm, and is open to all members (others can come but will not be able to vote).

To become a member, you need to agree with the objectives of *Auckland Pride Festival* and sign up online. <u>Click here</u> for more info and to fill in the Membership Application Form.

All members can vote on remits and the election of officers.

Nominations for elected members (people to stand on the Board), agenda items (anything you want on the agenda) and Life Membership **need to be with the Board by July 3rd** (28 days before the AGM).

- July 3: Nominations for elected members (officers) close, <u>click here</u> for the Board Member nomination form
- July 3: Agenda closes this means no more items can be added for discussion at the AGM
- July 3: Life Membership nominations close, <u>click here</u> for the Life Membership nomination form

- At the close-off date of 3 July, all members registered will receive the agenda, nominations for elected members and life members.





Joint media statement from New Zealand Police and Auckland Pride

Last week, New Zealand Police were advised by the Board of Auckland Pride that a decision had been made that Police officers were welcome to participate in the 2019 Auckland Pride Parade, but would not be able to march in uniform.

The Board had come to this decision following a series of Auckland Pride Community Hui in which people had come forward with feedback that the presence of Police – and, in particular, the visibility of the Police uniform – had made them feel less safe about participating in the Auckland Pride Parade.

New Zealand Police acknowledge their views, and support the Auckland Pride Parade as a safe space for all to attend. However, Police were disappointed by the Board's decision and have subsequently withdrawn their application to march in the 2019 Parade.

New Zealand Police are committed to working with rainbow communities, and proud of the work they currently do to celebrate diversity and support their rainbow community. However, Police acknowledge that there are also areas where we can improve in this space.

Police and Auckland Pride have been in discussions since the Board's decision was made. We are committed to working alongside each other in order to build safer communities together.

Auckland Pride will also be facilitating opportunities for non-uniformed Police officers to march with local rainbow community groups and other participating organisations.

Auckland Pride's major public event, the Parade along Ponsonby Road is first and foremost a celebration of and for Tāmaki Makaurau's rainbow communities — which includes people identifying as gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, intersex, takatāpui, whakawāhine, tangata ira tāne, fa'afafine, fakaleiti, akava'ine, māhū, vaka sa lewa lewa, rae rae, fiafifine, fakafifine, palopa, kathoey, hijra, baklâ, genderfluid, genderqueer, pansexual, asexual, queer and questioning.

New Zealand Police will work alongside Auckland Pride on an ongoing basis to develop an agreed plan in which both organisations will move forward together to find solutions to the issues and concerns that have been raised, and to support healing and reconciliation.

This plan will create opportunities for Police to connect with rainbow communities throughout the 2019 Festival – from safe spaces to talk about tough issues, to opportunities to see the Police rainbow car, dogs, horses and uniformed Police staff at other Festival events, including the Ending HIV Big Gay Out and the Auckland Pride Dog Show.

The Board of Auckland Pride wishes to thank the New Zealand Police for their willingness to listen and work alongside rainbow communities towards upholding the rights and dignity of all people of diverse sexual orientation, gender identities, gender expressions and sex characteristics living in Aotearoa New Zealand.

The Board apologises to our rainbow communities for any distress that may have been caused by this decision, and thanks those who engaged in the resulting debate in a thoughtful and respectful manner.

The Board invites people who wish to talk about the Police decision to attend a special Auckland Pride Community Hui, facilitated by Tim Foote, at the Grey Lynn Community Centre this Sunday 18 November, commencing at 7.30pm.

Joint media statement from New Zealand Police and Auckland Pride

Last week, New Zealand Police were advised by the Board of Auckland Pride that a decision had been made that Police officers were welcome to participate in the 2019 Auckland Pride Parade, but would not be able to march in uniform.

The Board had come to this decision following a series of Auckland Pride Community Hui in which people had come forward with feedback that the presence of Police – and, in particular, the visibility of the Police uniform – had made them feel less safe about participating in the Auckland Pride Parade.

New Zealand Police acknowledge their views, and support the Auckland Pride Parade as a safe space for all to attend. However, Police were disappointed by the Board's decision and have subsequently withdrawn their application to march in the 2019 Parade.

New Zealand Police are committed to working with rainbow communities, and proud of the work they currently do to celebrate diversity and support their rainbow community. However, Police acknowledge that there are also areas where they can improve in this space.

Police and Auckland Pride have been in discussions since the Board's decision was made. We are committed to working alongside each other in order to build safer communities together.

Police staff, including rainbow-friendly Diversity Liaison Officers (DLO's), will still attend the 2019 Parade in an operational capacity to ensure a safe event for everyone to enjoy. For a list of Rainbow DLO contacts go to: www.police.govt.nz/dlos

Auckland Pride will also be facilitating opportunities for non-uniformed Police officers to march with local rainbow community groups and other participating organisations.

The Police rainbow car, dogs, horses and uniformed Police staff will be present at other Festival events, including the Ending HIV Big Gay Out and the Auckland Pride Dog Show.

Auckland Pride's major public event, the Parade along Ponsonby Road is first and foremost a celebration of and for Tāmaki Makaurau's rainbow communities — which includes people identifying as gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, intersex, takatāpui, whakawāhine, tangata ira tāne, fa'afafine, fakaleiti, akava'ine, māhū, vaka sa lewa lewa, rae rae, fiafifine, fakafifine, palopa, kathoey, hijra, baklâ, genderfluid, genderqueer, pansexual, asexual, queer and questioning.

New Zealand Police will work alongside Auckland Pride on an ongoing basis to develop an agreed plan in which both organisations will move forward together to find solutions to the issues and concerns that have been raised.

The Board of Auckland Pride wishes to thank the New Zealand Police for their willingness to listen and work alongside rainbow communities towards upholding the rights and dignity of all people of diverse sexual orientation, gender identities, gender expressions and sex characteristics living in Aotearoa New Zealand.

The Board apologises to our rainbow communities for any distress that may have been caused by this decision, and thanks those who engaged in the resulting debate in a thoughtful and respectful manner.

The Board invites people who wish to talk about the Police decision to attend a special Auckland Pride Community Hui, facilitated by Tim Foote, at the Grey Lynn Community Centre this Sunday 18 November, commencing at 7.30pm.

Police and Auckland Pride Joint Press Release Wednesday 14th November 2017

New Zealand Police were advised by the Pride Board last week that a decision had been made that Police officers were allowed to take part in the Auckland Pride Parade in 2019 – but were unable to march in uniform.

Police acknowledge their views and we support the Pride Parade in creating a safe space for all to attend.

New Zealand Police was disappointed by this decision however and we have subsequently withdrawn our application to march in the Pride Parade next year.

Police are committed to supporting and working with our Rainbow community and we are proud of the work we currently do to celebrate diversity and support our Rainbow community. However we also acknowledge that there are also areas where we can improve in this space.

Police have been in discussions with the Pride Board since this decision was made and we are committed to working alongside each other in order to build safer communities together.

There will be an agreed plan where Police will work alongside the Pride Board and our Rainbow partners on an ongoing basis in order to move forward and find solutions to these concerns raised.

Police staff, including Rainbow-friendly Diversity Liaison Officers (DLO's) will still attend the parade in an operational capacity to support a safe event for everyone to enjoy.

For those who are hoping to see our police dogs, horses, rainbow car and uniformed staff at Pride events, you will be able to see us attending other festival events including "Woof" on February 3rd and the Big Gay Out on February 10th.

Valuing diversity and Pride for me is all about inclusiveness.

Last week, New Zealand Police was advised by the Board of Auckland Pride that a decision had been made that Police officers were welcome to participate in the 2019 Auckland Pride Parade, but would not be able to march in uniform.

The Board came to this decision following its annual series of consultation meetings, during which members of our rainbow communities had come forward with feedback about the presence of Police. The visibility of the Police uniform, in particular, had made them feel less safe about participating in the Auckland Pride Parade.

Issues and concerns relating to New Zealand Police were raised again and again throughout a series of four Auckland Pride Community Hui that were held across Tāmaki Makaurau during August. Complaints about Police consistently outnumbered feedback about any other institution or organisation.

A special Hot Topic Hui was organised for October, so the Board could hear more views from our communities on the place of New Zealand Police within Auckland Pride.

The personal experiences of Police mistreatment shared by LGBTQIA+ people throughout this lengthy consultation process were deeply affecting. The Board could not ignore them.

The Board's decision to ask Police to march in the 2019 Auckland Pride Parade, out of uniform, was a compromise. The intention was to encourage all people within our rainbow communities to feel safe and included within their own event – without having to exclude our valued LGBTQIA+ Police officers.

New Zealand Police subsequently decided to exclude its own people, because they could not wear a uniform that was causing LGBTQIA+ people and communities to feel unwelcome at an LGBTQIA+ event. Auckland Pride values people over uniforms.

Auckland Pride's major public event, the Parade along Ponsonby Road is first and foremost a celebration of and for Tāmaki Makaurau's rainbow communities – which includes people identifying as gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, intersex, takatāpui, whakawāhine, tangata ira tāne, fa'afafine, fakaleiti, akava'ine, māhū, vaka sa lewa lewa, rae rae, fiafifine, fakafifine, palopa, kathoey, hijra, baklâ, genderfluid, genderqueer, pansexual, asexual, queer and questioning.

Following the Board's decision, and subsequent Police decision, both organisations have been engaged in ongoing dialogue, and have expressed a commitment to work alongside each other in order to build safer communities together.

Police staff, including Diversity Liaison Officers (DLO's), will still be engaging with the 2019 Parade in an operational capacity. For a list of rainbow-friendly DLO contacts, please visit: www.police.govt.nz/dlos

Auckland Pride has offered to facilitate opportunities for non-uniformed Police officers to march in the 2019 Parade with local rainbow community groups and other participating organisations.

Auckland Pride will continue to work with New Zealand Police towards an equitable partnership and long-term plan in which both organisations can move forward together to explore solutions to the issues and concerns that have been raised, and to support healing and reconciliation.

The Board of Auckland Pride wishes to acknowledge New Zealand Police for their willingness to work alongside rainbow communities towards upholding the rights and dignity of all people of diverse sexual orientation, gender identities, gender expressions and sex characteristics living in Aotearoa New Zealand.

The Board apologises to our rainbow communities for any distress that may have been caused by this decision, and our lack of communication over the past week. The Board had agreed to work on a joint statement with Police, and remained silent out of respect for this process.

Thank you to all those who engaged in the intervening debate in a thoughtful and respectful manner. Auckland Pride's objective is to create safe spaces for our communities and to discuss the issues that are important to them.

The Board invites people who wish to talk about the Police decision to attend a special Auckland Pride Community Hui, facilitated by Tim Foote, at the Grey Lynn Community Centre this Sunday 18 November, commencing at 7.30pm.
