Aide memoire to the Minister of Statistics: Meeting with the Data Iwi Leaders Group on 22 February 2019

Purpose

- 1. At the first lwi Chairs' Forum hui for 2019 at Waitangi, the following data considerations were raised with the Prime Minister and your Ministerial colleagues:
 - The National Iwi Chairs have serious concerns with the process and results of the 2018 Census. We know this will have severe consequences for our iwi data; for population-based funding for our whanau; for our Māori political voice (electoral boundaries); for the revitalisation of our language (through the lack of quality robust data); for truly measuring the well-being of our whanau, hapu and iwi;
 - The National Iwi Chairs request an urgent meeting with the relevant Ministers to ascertain the extent of the inaccuracies of the 2018 Census data and we request a commitment to co-design relevant and real solutions to iwi/Māori data needs.
- 2. A meeting has been scheduled for 22 February with the Data Iwi Leaders Group in respect to the above, to assure the leaders of our commitment to work together to address iwi/Māori data needs. Liz MacPherson and Rhonda Paku will also attend in support.

Talking points

- High quality data for iwi is important to the Government. Iwi Chairs can be assured that we are committed to supporting them and Stats NZ to co-design relevant and real solutions.
- That said, the analysis and output of census data is something that can only be pursued at an
 organisational level Ministers cannot be involved in the creation of statistics.
- The best thing the Chairs can do is continue to work closely with Stats NZ. I expect Stats NZ to work together with iwi on the data available to support them.
- Stats NZ will be able to give a clearer picture of when census data will be available and what it
 will look like in April 2019.

Background

- 3. The planned first release of 2018 Census data in March is no longer possible.
 - Stats NZ will be able to give a clearer picture of when census data will be available and what it will look like in April 2019.
 - Stats NZ is developing and extending a range of statistical methods to adjust for limitations in the data collected and to understand the quality of the results produced. This includes using government data about real people, (such as births, tax, health and education records), to compensate for the information it is missing.
 - These methods are drawn from long-term plans to transform the census, but Stats NZ is using them sooner than expected.
- 4. Stats NZ is exploring how to accommodate the limits of government data and how to best combine the data with the extensive information it has collected from millions of New Zealanders during the 2018 Census.

- Research shows that government data has strengths and weaknesses and that there are some gaps and inconsistencies in what other data sources can tell us, for example, who lives together in a household and Māori descent and iwi data.
- Where there are gaps that may be difficult to mitigate, we are also considering complementary strategies to support information needs.
- Stats NZ is also working with iwi and Māori focused organisations as the impact of the lower response rates on Māori descent and iwi data becomes clearer.
- 5. Stats NZ has acknowledged it didn't make it easy enough for everyone to take part in the census.
 - A number of contributing factors are being tested and validated as part of the independent review that is currently underway and is due to report in July 2019.
 - The review is being led by New Zealand management consultant Murray Jack and Canadian census expert, Connie Graziadei.
 - Stats NZ has also established an External Data Quality Panel to help assess and review the methods being developed, and are continuing to work with their international colleagues too.

Key points

lwi leaders raised their concerns that officials may use the absence of data being available as an excuse not to engage. They asked for ongoing conversations to come up with solutions. Ministers and Liz agreed to talk with their respective colleagues to make them aware of the situation and the importance of this not impacting on engagement.

The iwi leaders were clear that they expected urgency on this. This was acknowledged by Minister Shaw who also made the point that Stats NZ is not the best resourced government agency.

The iwi leaders talked about their priorities:

- Improving iwi, whanau, hapū data in key administrative data sources DIA and Ministry of Health they want be involved in the design
- Collection of specific datasets with the top priority being te reo
- Iwi information for those in the settlement process.


They were very supportive of a strong partnership and suggested that a joint presentation of a cocreated framework to improve data for lwi to the next lwi Leaders Group meeting in May could be the first of its kind. This got a lot of support from both Ministers and Liz.

The iwi leaders shared a number of ideas they had to progress things including expanding regional digital hubs to digital and data hubs.




